# In Waltherville

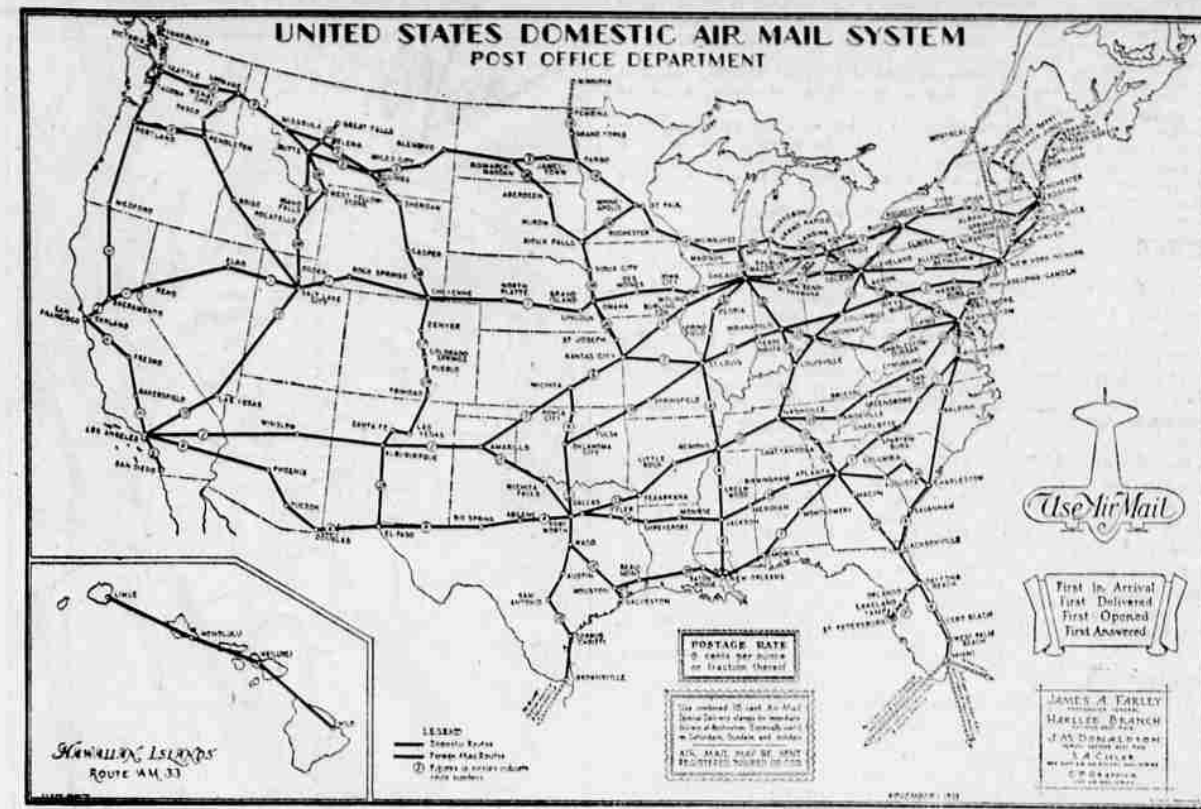

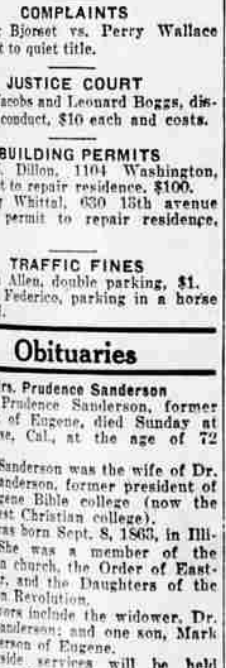
**Professor Merriam To Address Rotary**
