Members of the Presbyterian choir practiced in Eugene Friday night in preparation for a number to be presented on a program at the Synod meeting this week.

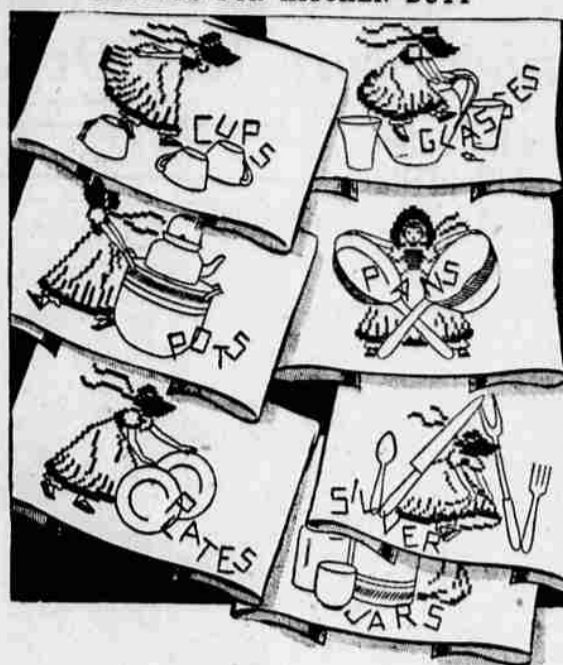
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H. N. Traxler of Eugene is in charge of carpenter work begun last week at the school house. Robert Smith has been helping him.
