Named Moderator

Dr. J. K. Howard, Glendale, was named moderator of the Presbyterian Synod of Oregon, at the opening meeting Tuesday night. Rev. William B. Mahon, Portland, will continue as stated clerk and as treasurer, and Rev. J. Y. Stewart, Eugene, is permanent clerk. Vice-moderator and temporary clerk will be named Wednesday, it was announced.

More than 125 ministers, elders and others were present for the opening session at which Rev. Andrew Carrick, Portland, retiring moderator, delivered the sermon. He chose as his text, "Ye Shall Be Witnesses Unto Me," Acts 1:8, and pointed out the need today for Christian leadership and the importance of Christianity as an aid in solving modern day problems.

Welcome to the campus was extended by Dr. Dan E. Clark, professor of history. Others who spoke tonight were Rev. Frank S. Beitel, pastor of the United Lutheran church here, who greeted the Presbyterians on behalf of the Eugene Ministerial association, and Rev. Milton S. Weber, pastor of the Presbyterian church.

Rev. William L. Killian, Portland, presided at the communion, with Rev. James M. Cornelison, Pendleton area, administering the bread and Rev. Thomas Robinson, of the Southwestern synod, administering the cup.

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LIONS HEAR TALK ON DOPE ADDICTION BY TITUS FRAZEE

Titus A. Frazee, formerly assistant state organizer for the White Cross, anti-narcotic association in California, addressed the Lions club on the perils and pitfalls of the dope traffic. He stressed the fact that, though 30 years ago 90 per cent of the dope addiction was caused inadvertently as the result of treatment by doctors, at the present time 90 per cent is maliciously caused by dope peddlers and other addicts. This, he pointed out, was the result of the high prices commanded by cocaine, heroine and other narcotics, and the insane mania that forces addicts to make even their best friends victims of the habit. "The dope habit," he declared, "is absolutely impossible to cure. Of 3,000 supposed cures in an eastern hospital that specialized in this work, 90 per cent, according to a survey, returned to the habit one week after they were discharged as cured, and 99 5-10 succumbed to the curse within a month after release."

He maintained that the majority of cases reported to the police of persons who have been slugged or killed by robbers disappointed in obtaining money were the result of frenzy generated in the mind of the dope-crazed criminal who must have his "shot" if he has to commit murder for it.

Dope peddlers, he declared, have "missionaries" whose business it is to create new clients for their wares, and unsuspecting persons may be made the victims of the habit through an acquaintance who offers them a "Headache powder" or similar cure for aches or pains. He warned his listeners to beware of taking any gratuitous powders or medicine not prescribed by a regular physician.

Mr. Frazee is at present connected with the Alexander Institute and is continuing his lecture work on addiction through his interest in the subject.

84 Building Permits Are Issued in June

The city engineer's report for the month of June shows 8 new buildings, with valuation at \$42,140, and 76 permits to repair buildings, with valuation placed at \$13,455, totaling \$55,595.

Receipts from new building permit fees, \$77.25; repair building permit fees, \$87.25; electrical license, \$35; electrical permit fees, \$55.35; plumbing license, \$4; plumbing permit fees, \$20.75; sign permit fees, \$7; miscellaneous fees, \$1.50; and blueprinting, \$34.15. This totals \$328.25.

Two teachers are in charge from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. and all parents are invited to take advantage of the facilities offered. Arrangements have been made to enable smaller children to take their daily afternoon nap under supervision.

The all-city baseball teams will meet Wednesday afternoon in four contests. In the junior division Frances Willard plays Lincoln at Lincoln and Condon plays Skinner Butte at Skinner Butte. In the senior division Lincoln meets Frances Willard at the latter's home grounds and Skinner Butte tangles with Condon at Condon.

Flax Crop Pulling Starts by Week-end

First steps towards harvesting 1030's flax crop in Lane county are to be taken this week-end when some of the flax will be ready to pull.

SHOWERS ADVANCE ON DROUGHT BELT

CHICAGO, July 15.—(AP)—Scattered thunder showers scored local triumphs over the drought in the central part of the middle west and a mass of cool air enveloped the states from the Great Lakes eastward today, but Weather Forecaster J. R. Lloyd said the victory over 12-day heat wave was far from complete.

Added deaths in the affected areas sent the list for the period to the 3,670 mark.

In the northwest states of Montana, Wyoming, Nebraska and the Dakotas, visited early this week by rains, temperatures again soared with no indication of additional showers.

New outbursts of buying were experienced in the grain pits of the Chicago board of trade. Corn jumped up more than 3 cents a bushel at times and wheat as much as 4 1/4 cents a bushel, and to the limit of 5 cents in Kansas City.

Local storms drove down the temperatures in four states where the loss of life was heaviest, but a tabulation in these states showed the following deaths:

Minnesota, 707; Michigan, 508; Illinois, 401, and Wisconsin, 363.

Hot weather continued over the lower Missouri valley, the middle west and upper Mississippi and Ohio valleys and the southwest portion of the Great Lakes region.
