COTTAGE GROVE, July 16.—(Special).—Mrs. Annie Eliza Lyon, pioneer teacher of Lane and Marion counties, died Thursday morning at the family home in the Blue Mountain section, upper Mosby creek. Mrs. Lyon had lived at her ranch there since 1876 and had lived in that community since 1872. She was honored recently at a reunion gathering by several of her former pupils.

Mrs. Lyon was Annie Eliza Rawlings before her marriage. She was born May 18, 1850, in Fulton, Mo., coming across the plains in 1866.

She was married to Clark Lyon in 1876. She was a member of the Presbyterian church.

Funeral services are to be held at 2 p. m. Saturday at the Brumbaugh cemetery. Rev. J. A. Smith officiating. Mills chapel is in charge of arrangements.

Dr. Clark Wants 3 More Students To Fill 700 Quota
