

UNIVERSITY KEEPS ABREAST OF TIMES WITH NEW COURSES

The University of Oregon will keep step with the times this coming school year in course of offerings, it was announced here Friday by Dr. C. Valentine Boyer, president. A number of new courses, most of them dealing with modern day conditions, will be offered, and many other offerings will be brought up to date by faculty members, it was stated.

Two courses regarded as of utmost importance will be offered in the department of philosophy this fall for the first time. They are "Philosophical Backgrounds of Modern Literature," to be taught by Dr. George Rebec, dean of the graduate school and head of the philosophy department, and "Scientific Background of Modern Literature," by Dr. E. H. Moore, professor of sociology.

New Anthropology Department. Students interested in anthropology will find a new department, headed by Dr. L. S. Cressman, which will offer several courses in this fascinating field of study. The courses include general anthropology, introduction to cultural anthropology, problems of race and culture and others.

In history a new course that will deal with the fast changing conditions in various parts of the world, "History of Modern Times," will be offered by Dr. Harold J. Noble, who has made a special study, much of it by personal observation, of various oriental and other countries.

Psychology Course Added. A course that is expected to draw a number of students whose factual background in one of the newer sciences, psychology, will be "Physiological Foundation of Human Behavior," to be taught by Dr. A. R. Moore, professor of physiology. This course will take up the physiology of animal behavior, nerve, physiology, tropisms, and conditional reflexes, as well as the effects of environment and internal secretions on animal conduct.

Students who desire an understanding of the problems of adjustment of family life may enroll in "Family Relationships," a course to be offered in the non-major household economics department. It will be taught by Miss Emma Jane Peterson, instructor in household economics.

Freshman week of the fall term opens September 21, and classes start September 28.

CLINIC PLANNED ON NEXT TUESDAY

DEERBORN, July 17.—(Special)—A summer roundup of pre-school children, sponsored by the local Parent-Teacher association will be held next Tuesday, July 21, at the Deerborn schoolhouse. On the same day skin tests for tuberculosis will be given to adults and children. Also the smallpox vaccinations and diphtheria inoculations will be given on the same day instead of at a separate clinic as previously announced. The physical examinations, vaccinations and inoculations are all absolutely free. It is desired that everyone wishing to take advantage of this offer be present at this is the only clinic to be held here this summer. The work will be in charge of Dr. A. N. Johnson, county health officer, assisted by Mrs. Ruth C. Hinesgardner, public health nurse, both of Eugene. Several local helpers will also assist.

Mrs. Earl Thienes is chairman of the summer roundup committee of the P.-T. A. About 35 children and adults have signified their intention of taking the tuberculin test and a lesser number for smallpox and diphtheria as the two latter treatments have been given here every year since the P.-T. A. has been organized six years ago. The clinic starts at 10 o'clock in the morning.

Detectives Determine Branded Girl Lying

WASHINGTON, July 17.—(AP)—Police tacked the label "weird fabrication" on Margaret Louise Bell's "Luciano Vengeance" story today and decided to turn the 21-year-old girl

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over to Baltimore authorities to face a charge of stealing \$700 in bonus money from a war veteran.

Thus ended five days of intensive efforts to check the girl's bizarre story of an assault by henchmen of Charles (Lucky) Luciano, New York vice czar, in her apartment early Sunday. The letters "C. L." had been scratched on her abdomen. She claimed Luciano was seeking vengeance because she testified against him before a New York grand jury.

Alaska Pilot Hurt; Passenger Killed

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, July 17.—(AP)—Percy Hubbard, Alaska mercantile pilot, was in serious condition at St. Joseph's hospital today from injuries suffered in a plane crash which killed Mrs. Nora Lehto, a passenger, and critically injured her daughter, Betty Thomas.

Mrs. Lehto was killed when Hubbard's plane, owned by Dr. Bart Larue of Fairbanks, went out of control and winged over in the University of Alaska campus.

FALL UNIVERSITY CATALOGUE READY

The new revised University of Oregon catalogue for 1936-37, containing all possible information on courses offered, registration procedure, faculty, buildings, and other data is ready for distribution to high school graduates and others interested. It was announced here by George N. Belnap, university editor.

A map of the campus contains, for the first time, sites of the new university buildings now under construction. These are the new library, physical education plant and infirmary, projects which total nearly \$1,000,000 in cost.

Detailed information on expenses of attending the university, including fees, living costs and incidentals, will be found in the volume. It also lists honor societies, clubs, publications and various student activities. Scholarships, prizes and other awards are also included.

Assistant Camp Director Wirt and Jack Stafford will conduct a hike to Linton Lake. The boys will hike to surrounding points and do considerable swimming and fishing in the warm lake. This hike is always popular with the younger boys at camp, as it is not too strenuous and the boys always have a good trip.

Al Tingle and Jack Brown are taking a group of boys up Blue River to the lookout station on top of Carpenter mountain. The scouts will spend one day at the ranger station and return to their base camp about ten miles away. While at the base camp, Tingle will continue his advancement program and the scouts will have a chance to pass tests before Sunday.

Nine boys and one leader will ascend the Middle Sister. The group left Tuesday afternoon to join the Skyline and make the trip with them. Each year at camp, the Skyline trip is offered to the older scouts. The group will travel into Scott camp the first night, form a base camp at Camp Riley or at the Obsidian camp.

FOREST SUGGESTS BREITENBUSH FOR WEEKEND JOURNEY

(Editor's Note: Following is another of a series of weekly dispatches, presented by United Press and U. S. forestry service, describing the opportunities for week-end or longer trips into the U. S. national forests of the Pacific Northwest).

PORTLAND, Ore., July 17.—(AP)—The forest service recommends to Oregon motorists the Breitenbush lake loop trip in the Mt. Hood national forest. The length of this loop, from Portland to Government camp, Government camp down the Skyline road to Breitenbush hot springs, then to Detroit, Salem and back to Portland, is 232 miles.

More than half the distance is through forested country.

"The mile high Cascades, rushing streams, crystal lakes with the two sentinels, Hood and Jefferson, invite the motorist along this route," the forest service reported.

Choice Spots On Way. Stopping places, choice picnic spots, improved motorist camps, or comfortable lodgings with meals for those who prefer a less rugged type of recreation, are available at strategic points along the way.

"Turn off the Wapinitia highway at 'Blue Box' 68 miles from Portland in the Mt. Hood national forest," the service said. "Follow the Skyline road south past Clear Lake, Clockamas Lake to Olallie Lake or Breitenbush Lake. This is a land of mountain lakes, many of which afford good fishing. Views from this section toward the Deschutes country to the east or down into the jagged peaks and yawning canyons of the Santiam to the west, or of Mt. Jefferson towering to the south, will be a memorable experience."

Boating, swimming and fishing are attractions at Olallie Lake and Breitenbush Lake and free forest camp grounds are available.

Caution With Fire. Forestry officials emphasized free-

dom as the keynote of national forest recreation, the simple requirements of caution with fire, principally with cigarettes and camp fires being all that are stressed.

Numerous hiking trips are possible, notably the six mile trip from Breitenbush Lake to Jefferson park, in the national forest primitive area from which roads and developments are permanently barred. Glacial lakes and rare wild flowers in this area are perhaps unsurpassed elsewhere along the Oregon Cascade ranges, the forest service says.

Climbing for the tricky ascent of the mountain starts at Jefferson park. The peak's elevation is 10,495 feet.

From Breitenbush Lake the mountain range breaks off abruptly down to Breitenbush hot springs where the road leads.

Meals and sleeping accommodations, with baths and swimming, are available here. The drive down the North Santiam through Mill City to Salem affords views of a more tameful character, but the river itself with its gorges and rapids reflects the higher country from which it and the traveler have come.
