

# Local Produce Markets Very Active; Wall Street Is Booming Alone

## MORE PEACHES, CORN COME IN ON LOCAL MARKETS

All local produce continued steady. Saturday, Friday prices holding in all lines—butter, butterfat, eggs, and poultry.

In the vegetable and fruit lists, local grown peaches are quoted around 15 to 20 cents a bushel, buying price. Very few coming in as yet. The local corn is coming in fairly plentifully now, listed still at 20 cents a dozen ears, buying price.

Local grown raspberries are about over with. Practically all berries of any kind are scarce as the season advances.

## Grain Prices Fall On Chicago Market

CHICAGO, July 18.—(AP)—Smashed by rain and cooler weather which replaced drought and heat, corn prices broke four cents a bushel today in wild trading, and wheat was down 3 1/2 cents.

Official forecasts were that most of the drought belt would have at least temporary relief. Predictions were that more rain was needed over the entire South American agricultural region before the drought will be ended.

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## PRICES HOLD UP AT WEEKEND DUE TO GOOD REPORT

NEW YORK, July 18.—(AP)—Showers in the corn belt, together with continued favored industrial news, helped to keep the stock market on a fairly even keel today, but recovery vigor was lacking except in specialties.

A number of issues, at their best, were at new highs for the past five years. The close was steady. Transfers approximated 500,000 shares.

Electric, Anaconda, Kennecott, Magna Copper, Dupont, North American, Consolidated Edison, International Paper Preferred, Atlantic Coast Line, Delaware & Hudson, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Timken-Detroit, California Packing, Fajardo Sugar, Phillips Petroleum, Goodyear and Standard Oil of New Jersey, were all up 2 points or better.

Norfolk and Western was down about 4 points on a single transfer. Sears Roebuck yielded a point.

PORTLAND BUTTER PRICES SLASHED

PORTLAND, July 18.—(AP)—Conflicting interests in the dairy trade which resulted in the special session of the Produce Exchange Friday morning, resulting in the lowering of butter prices except for extras, is creating an erratic tone in the butterfat market. The conflict has to do with prices on the local and California exchanges.

Eggs retained their strong tone. Good quality stock is finding favor and some withdrawals from cold storage are noted.

Limited number of young turkeys are being marketed for which there is good demand and favorable prices. Live chickens were in firm demand with full prices offered.

Lower prices are being named for potatoes with a congestion of local stock due to anxiety of small producers to take a profit.

Country killed meat trade maintained its good situation and prices, with a slight carryover of veal suggested.

Record-breaking demand for Oregon-grown celery throughout the country, was indicated by a survey conducted by the Journal, with prices holding firm. A huge movement to the midwest, the southeast and the southwest was indicated. Even Florida is calling for Oregon celery.

WOOL IMPROVES

BOSTON, July 18.—(AP)—A broadening inquiry and scattered increases in demand were extensive enough to give the Boston wool market a slight improvement in tone, softness in prices was still noted in some of the least attractive fine original territory wools, but good fine territory and twelve month Texas wools were held
