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FRANCES WILLARD PLAYGROUND WINS KITE TOURNAMENT

Fun, thrills and spills featured the all-city kite tournament held Saturday at the fairgrounds, starting at 10 a. m. A large airplane kite had a crack-up and one of the judges was a victim of the accident. Fifty-three kites were entered.

Lincoln playground had 16 kites, Frances Willard 11, Condon 15, and Skinner Butte 11, entered in the tournament. A variety of kites was present, airplane kites, box kites, and one only about an inch and a half long. Sizes ranged up to 12 feet long.

Frances Willard playground carried off the day's honors, amassing 43 points. Lincoln playground was second with 36 points, and Skinner Butte was third with 13 points. Condon placed fourth.
