Playground Golf Tourney Friday; Regulations Given

Playgrounds of Eugene will hold the annual all-city "tin-can golf" tournament Friday at the Skinner Butte park, with rules released Wednesday by Leonard Scroggins and R. L. Hennrich, officials of the tourney. Regulations follow:

Each playground is entitled to two representatives in each division, that is two girls for both the junior and senior groups and likewise two boys for each group. Also each playground will be entitled to a two man team which may be either juniors or seniors or a combination of both. Drawings will be made and the playgrounds will be paired against each other.

Only wooden clubs may be used. Old tennis balls must be used for the ball.

In determining the individual championship, the four representatives in each group shall play 18 holes and the player having the lowest score shall be declared the winner. In determining the team championship, two playgrounds will play one another. The team having the lowest score for 18 holes shall be declared the winner. Regular golf rules shall govern the play. Points will be awarded for individual and team competition on the following basis: First, 5; second, 3; third, 2; fourth, 1. Ribbons will be awarded the champion in each event.

Springfield Pastor Is Notified of Post

SPRINGFIELD, July 22.—(Special)—Dr. J. D. McCormick, pastor of the Methodist church in Springfield, has received notice of his appointment to the stationing committee from the state office.

Dr. McCormick's work on this committee will consist mainly in passing upon entrants into the clergy. He has been prominent in state Methodist circles for a long period, and at one time was with Willamette university in Salem. He will deliver the message at the union service next Sunday evening at the Baptist church.

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DR. CLARK TALKS ON PLACE HELD BY WHITMAN IN HISTORY

It is fitting at this time that those sections featuring the early Oregon history pay tribute to one of the heroic characters of the early west—Dr. Marcus Whitman, said Dr. Dan E. Clark, professor of history at the University of Oregon and director of the campus summer session, in a talk for the Eugene Lions club, Wednesday noon. His remarks generally were on the Whitman centennial to be given this summer at Walla Walla.

Dr. Clark briefly reviewed events in the Oregon territory before the coming of Whitman and his party in 1836. "Whatever is said about the missionaries and what they did, it must be said they were the only ones who came with altruistic purposes, something that can not be said of the

traders, the soldiers, or the settlers," the speaker commented.

Dr. Whitman and his party came as result of the movement to send missionaries to the west in the early thirties. The Methodist Episcopal church sent the first missionary party in that movement that came among American churches in that period; then the Presbyterians and Congregationalists joined forces in sending the Whitman party.

Commenting further on Dr. Whitman, Dr. Clark spoke of the ride back to the states made by Whitman late in '42. There has been much discussion as to why Dr. Whitman made this trip. Some have held the work of Dr. Whitman in taking this ride back "saved Oregon," while others hold it did not. Regardless of any controversy on the matter, it must be recognized that Dr. Whitman achieved much in arousing interest of settlers, the train of '43 being the first large one to come west across the plains, Dr. Clark pointed out.

Speaking of Mrs. Whitman, Dr. Clark amplified the part women played in the early Oregon days, pointing out that more recognition should be taken of the hardships and heroic effort made by the women of pioneer times.

The speaker then briefly reviewed

the conditions that existed leading up to the massacre of the Whitman party—the chance in Indian character, the havoc wrought by the rascals, and the realization on the part of the Indians that the settlers had come with the inevitable ruin for the Indians' existing life.

Prof. N. H. Conish introduced the speaker, Dr. Sam H. Tyler, club president, announced Percy W. Brown as chairman for the August programs. James Bruner, member of the Lions club at Cherokee, Oklahoma, was a guest.

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
