Lane park where they camped for the night.
Tuesday morning the farm of Walter Hubbard north of Junction City was visited and Suffolk and Hampshire sheep were judged. The Thistle-down farm of George W. Bond between Eugene and Junction City was the next objective. Aberdeen-Angus beef cattle were observed here and the party visited the irrigated pasture and the irrigation plant on the farm. They came to Eugene and ate lunch at the county fairgrounds and then visited the plant of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association.
In the afternoon the Prairie Bloom farm in the Meadowview district, also owned by Mr. Bond, was visited and here purebred Guernsey cattle were judged. The party then trekked to the Lake Creek valley where they camped on Lake creek, in the vicinity of Virgil Parker's dairy and poultry farm. Getting up before milking time, Wednesday morning, the clubbers judged Mr. Parker's cows before they were milked and afterward, too. The poultry plant was also visited. Mr. Parker having between 3000 and 4000 White Leghorn chickens. After judging some of the sheep on the place the party went back to Triangle lake for a swim and from there the Douglas, Tillamook and Multnomah delegations returned home by way of Florence while the rest of them came out through Eugene.
