For 24 hours Southern Pacific trains, due to arrive from the south over the Cascade line were detained over the old Siskiyou route on account of the washing out of a bridge just north of Dunsmuir on the Cascade route. They will have definite influences on local congressional, and even state elections this fall, but the chances are that in the purely national issue between London and Roosevelt their influence will largely disappear here in the industrial sections.

Certainly in this national election feelings are already running high. Pennsylvania, Ohio and Michigan—the three great states of the American industrial Ruhr valley, where this labor war is bitterest—are unquestionably key political states.

If London could land these three, he would have an excellent chance of being elected.

If Roosevelt could add them to his solid South, New York, and other almost sure states, he would unquestionably win.

Pennsylvania—and its 36 electoral votes—is still no man's, or rather anybody's, land. The Pittsburgh steel, iron, and coal country, bitter and aroused, is definitely on Roosevelt's side, and will send him into the eastern portion of the state with considerably more than 100,000 majority.

If Roosevelt can capture Philadelphia—or even hold down the normal republican lead—Pennsylvania may be his.

The chances today are that he will do just that. For labor in revolt will be strongly on his side.
