

UNUSUAL BUILDING BOOM IN JUNE SEEN FOR UNITED STATES

WASHINGTON, July 25.—(AP)—A June building boom of unusual proportions was reported to the labor department today by Commissioner Isador Lubin of the bureau of labor statistics.

His study, made in absence for Secretary Frances Perkins, now aboard ship on a three-week visit to Europe, showed the value of residential buildings erected last month was \$20,900,000, an increase of 142 per cent over the corresponding month of 1934.

"The increase in June of this year was widespread," Lubin said in his report. "Eight of the nine geographic regions showed gains over May. The total value of permits issued during June was 34 per cent greater than in the previous month. This is especially significant since in five of the past seven years building permit valuations have been lower in June than in May."

Residences Pronounced

It was disclosed that the most pronounced increase over May was also in residential building. Reports from 1,502 of the same population class cities showed a boost of 45 per cent in the value of this class of construction. Rises of 41 per cent and of seven per cent were registered in non-residential building and in alterations and repairs to existing structures.

An increase of 143 per cent in the number of family dwelling units in 708 cities with populations of more than 10,000 was registered last June over the same month of 1934.

A summation of the value of building permits issued during the first six months of the year showed that construction reached the total of \$610,000,000. This is an increase of 76 per cent over the first half of last year and is considered a prime factor in the steady rise in production activity and employment among the durable goods industries, sometimes regarded as a barometer of prosperity.

Federal on Decline
Government building, used to give lagging construction conditions a "shot in the arm," is now on the decline. The number and value of buildings for which contracts were awarded by federal and state governments in the cities included in Lubin's report was \$6,000,000 lower than the \$16,158,000 worth of such contracts in June, 1934.

REFUGEES ARRIVING GIBRALTAR, July 25.—(AP)—

BOLTON LANDING, N. Y., July 25.—(AP)—Kaye Don, visiting British automobile and speedboat pilot, became today the first foreigner to drive a winning boat in the 33-year-old Gold Cup regatta, America's premier motor boat classic.

The stocky Briton piloted the 11-year-old Impi. Detroit Yacht Club entry, over the 90 miles, in one hour and 58.12 minutes at an average speed of 45.734 miles per hour.

Alone in the field after the other eight entries withdrew, Don made no attempt to set any records and virtually coasted to victory as he pleased to return the cup to Detroit after a lapse of three years.

ing on the ground by a nurse, standing by, for a bit of red silk pinned on her sleeve in the form of a red cross. As the nurse hesitated the youngster leaped on one arm for strength, tore the cross from the nurse's sleeve and with his free arm kissed it. Then he fell back dead.

I talked to an army lieutenant who was in command of the loyalists. He told me that two days before, his men drove the rebels from a nearby mountain peak, with heavy losses, and that he was expecting a big counter attack at any moment.

The metallic clatter of machine guns from the valley below sent a peppering shower of bullets over us. The militiamen replied with rifles and pistols, saving ammunition for their machine gun for the expected attack. A couple of planes came overhead. The planes circled for about ten minutes and then let loose what seemed to be a series of small earthquakes. Three times the planes circled the position, each time dropping bombs.

Destruction Indescribable
The surprise had almost a greater effect than the attack itself.

As soon as the planes withdrew the fascists in the valley below began their attack apparently believing the bombing had demoralized the militiamen. They were driven back quickly by the fury of the militia defense.

When I left the encampment two hours after the fight, I came in a truck laden with the bodies of 20 militiamen. We passed a long line of trucks with militiamen going to reinforce their comrades.

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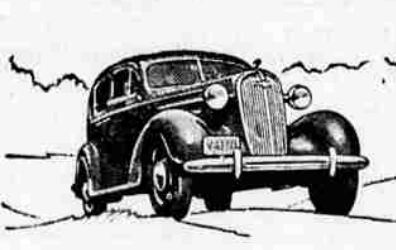
