BANK LIQUIDATION
NEARS COMPLETION

SPRINGFIELD, July 28—(Spe-
 cial)—Sale of remaining assets and
 claims of the First National Bank of
 Springfield was held at public auction
 here Monday afternoon by Receiver
 C. C. Bryan, as the final phase of
 liquidation.

The first bid received involved the
 sale of each item separately, the
 total coming to \$198. A second bid
 called for, resulted in a high bid of
 \$200, for the sale of all assets as a
 whole.

Before Monday's sale, Mr. Bryan
 received \$157.00 on a claim held by
 the Springfield bank against a bank in
 Washington.

Both items will go to the compo-
 nent of the currency, and the bid
 selected will then be submitted to
 the United States district court of
 jurisdiction in Portland. If the sale
 is approved, a dividend on all funds
 received by the establishment since
 the last dividend payment was made,
 will be declared.

Mr. Bryan indicated that there

would be a substantial final dividend,
 after final expenses have been ex-
 tracted, and the remainder turned
 over to creditors and depositors. He
 did not name a definite percentage of
 payment. The process will probably
 involve at least 60 days.

With the forthcoming settlement,
 the payment is expected to reach
 the 100 per cent mark, since already
 the bank has given out 70 per cent
 on all deposits.

The bulk of Monday's sale was for
 notes, judgments, and real estate,
 against which there were incum-
 brances.

The Federated Malay States pro-
 duce nearly one-third of the world's
 tin supply, and hold first place in
