## RE-MOUNT STATION ESTABLISHED HERE

A re-mount station, at which 30 pack horses will be kept for emergency service during forest fires, has been established in the McKenzie area near Lost Creek ranch, it was announced Friday by Roy Elliott, assistant supervisor of the Willamette forest.

The horses are being kept in a pasture with two packers in charge. A loading ramp and corral has been built so that the animals may be moved quickly to points of danger.

Fifteen animals were received Thursday, completing the assignment of 30 horses for this station, Mr. Elliott said. The re-mount station is part of the system of providing pack horses for use on fires throughout the forest. One of the greatest difficulties in fighting the McKenzie blaze last year was in getting pack horses to carry food supplies to the firefighters, Elliott said.
