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PROGRESS IN AIR TRAVEL DESCRIBED BY FORUM SPEAKER

Members of the Eugene chamber of commerce were taken on a "16-hour flight to New York"—pictorially—Friday noon when W. R. Thigpen, traveling passenger, agent of the United Airlines showed motion pictures of a trip across the continent.

Prefacing the pictures, Mr. Thigpen sketched the development of aviation since 1927, stating that in that year 6,000 passengers were carried in the air while in the year 1935 more than one million passengers were transported by airplanes.

Advances in meteorology, making possible more accurate data on weather conditions, have been of greatest aid to aviation, Thigpen declared. At the present, mass air movements, or winds, indicate probable weather conditions considerably in advance with the result that pilots and air dispatchers may schedule their transports with much greater security than in the pioneer days of flying, the speaker pointed out.

Touching on the navigation side of aviation, the speaker explained radio beams with which pilots are kept on their courses. A new beam now being developed will, when perfected, enable pilots to land planes without needing to use their normal "eye vision" at all, he said.

Another new development in flying is taking place in experiments in the dissipation of fog. At one field in the east, where the work is being carried on, researchers have succeeded in dissolving fog over an entire landing field up to a height of 200 feet which is sufficient for practical purposes, he said. When this development is perfected, the danger from fog will be greatly decreased.

A picture of traveling from coast to coast in 12 hours in planes with a capacity of 45 passengers and a cruising speed of 250 miles an hour was drawn by Thigpen who explained that planes able to do this were now being tested by leading aviation companies of the country who had allocated a million and a half dollars for the work.

The motion pictures showed one of the great airlines leaving the west coast, flying eastward over the Rockies, the great plains of the mid-west, to reach Chicago in 12 hours. From Chicago to New York the schedule calls for four and one-half hours as against the schedule of the famed Century Limited train of 17 hours.

Last year the airlines carried more passengers on this run than the Century Limited train, Thigpen declared, the fare by plane being approximately a dollar under that of the train fare with the time being four and one-half hours as against 17 hours.

COUGHLIN ARTICLE WILL PLAY HEARST, TACTICS OF PAPERS

ROYAL OAK, Mich., July 31.—(U.P.)—Father Charles E. Coughlin's paper, "Social Justice," in the issue for Aug. 3, will carry an open letter addressed to William Randolph Hearst, newspaper publisher, criticizing his papers for "false headlines" and "vicious news articles."

The open letter will be signed by Father Coughlin, a spokesman in his office here said.

The letter will be published on the first page of the paper under the headline "Coughlin Target of Hearst Attack." It will carry the radio priest's name as a byline.

Refers to Stories
The letter will refer to stories published last week in certain newspapers.

"As the publisher of one newspaper to another," Father Coughlin's letter will read, "I am address-

ing these paragraphs to William Randolph Hearst, who has been so severely duped by certain of his employees, bent on wrecking his property known as the Detroit Times and other of his newspapers."

The letter will contain a review of the stories as published last week, which contained references to telephone talks with the Vatican, which were to the effect that Father Coughlin would be killed or silenced by the pope. The letter claims the articles were credited to "unrevealed sources."

Wants Apology Only
"Mr. Hearst," the open letter will continue, "owes me nothing except an apology and I owe him nothing other than the right to defend myself at his expense insofar as the apology which his papers owe me has not been forthcoming."

"The point at issue is concerned not with malicious misrepresentation but with that sort of false headline and vicious news article which could be born only in the mind of Mr. Hearst's underpaid underlings."

In another paragraph, the letter will say:
"The veracity of these statements is no more truthful than if I were to print in the columns of Social Justice 'President Roosevelt spends week-ends with William Randolph Hearst and Earl Browder at San Simoun.'" The letter will also contain a denial

of any conversation via telephone with the Vatican.
"The fact of the matter is," Coughlin's letter will read, "I never telephoned the Vatican, or it never telephoned me."
