

Stocks Rally In Late Trading Hour; Some Egg Prices Advanced Here

DROUGHT NEWS IS DEPRESSING FORCE IN IMPLEMENT LINE

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Stocks, off balance during the greater part of today's brief session, rallied quietly in the final half-hour.

Drought news continued to depress some of the farm implement dealers and others, although the edge seemed to have worn off the selling even in the stocks of companies with an eye on agricultural incomes.

Losses of as much as 2 points were either reduced or cancelled by J. I. Case, Deere, International Harvester, American Telephone, American Water Works, Northern Pacific, Continental Can and Zenith Radio.

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Maximum soaring of prices that trading rules permit in any 24-hour period went hand in hand today with wild rushes to buy corn.

The corn market shot skyward four cents a bushel, and showed approximately 15 1/2 cent as bushel upturn for the week, and twice the quotations current at one stage this season. Government forecasts indicating that drought would become more acute the coming week were chiefly responsible, as pointing to increased corn crop damage of vast proportions next to impossible to gauge at present.

Corn closed strong at virtually the day's apex, 2 7/8-3 1/8 cents above yesterday's finish, Sept. 1.05 1/2; Dec. 97 1/4; May 96 1/4-3/8; wheat 1 5/8-2 1/4 advanced, Sept. 1.12 1/4-1/2, Dec. 1.13 1/4-1/2; oats 1 7/8-2 3/8 advanced, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 37 cents.
