

FASCISTS NEARING MADRID; WORLD'S POWERS WORRIED

ance against assault were dispatched to Zaragoza to help crush the revolt. An appeal to world powers from France to insure non-intervention in the civil war was coupled with a warning to any nations backing the rebels.

Government "Forced"

The government announced it had been "forced" to reserve liberty of judgment in supplying munitions to the leftist government after an investigation showed "foreign powers" were sending war materials to rebels. The countries involved were not named.

Great Britain, a high authority said, welcomed the plea for strict neutrality and strongly supported the move.

France, anxious to take no sides in the rebellion, gave a form of negative aid to the Madrid leftist government by permitting Frenchmen to cross the border and take up arms if they wished provided they carried regular passports. Diplomatic circles said such a stipulation effectively limited volunteers to those meeting with the approval of the Spanish government.

Rebels Enter Planes

It was reported in Paris that the rebels had placed a \$1,320,000 order for airplanes with Italy, but France was quoted as saying no contract of that kind had been entered into.

Some political quarters in Paris were represented as believing that Premier Mussolini of Italy and Chancellor Hitler of Germany might be in the background of the Spanish fascist movement.

The battlefront was farflung. In the north, in the south and at sea opposing forces traded blow for blow with partisan announcements of victories. Off Gijón loyal airplanes beat a tattoo on the decks of the rebel cruiser Almirante Cervera with bullets. In the town proper rebels fought off loyal infantry.

Bourbons in Picture

At Cannes, France, the former Spanish royal family disclosed that Prince Carlos, brother-in-law of the Prince of the Asturias, had gone to Spain to determine the attitude of the rebels toward the Bourbons. The family said he probably would join the insurrection.

The commander of a flight of Italian seaplanes which in part came to disaster over French Morocco was quoted as saying he was flying supplies to insurgents in Africa.

Civilians in the village of Oyarzun were slaughtered in a crossfire of fascist and loyal guns in the battle for control of the northern seaboard.

2 LOWELL MEN DIE AFTER QUARRELING; VAUGHAN KILLS SELF

was in the postoffice, adjacent to the store room.

Vaughan, according to witnesses, appeared under strain from the beginning, and apparently was determined to settle his differences with Lowman. Finally the argument came to a climax and Vaughan pulled out the pistol.

"Don't Use That"

"Don't use that, John," warned Downey, who hesitated when he recognized Vaughan's emotional strain.

Lowman, realizing his position, sought to calm Vaughan, entreating, "What have I done to you?"

Vaughan's answer was five shots, three of which went wild. One struck Lowman in the shoulder. Lowman staggered back, the egg crate tumbling off the counter to the floor, and Vaughan fired the final bullet.

Fired at Close Range

The shots were fired at close range, and his emotional unbalance may have caused his wildness. One of the shots went through the glass door behind Lowman, another went to the side, and the other, apparently aimed at Lowman's head as he lay on the floor, went under the door sill.

Mrs. Downey, in the postoffice, began to scream. She said she remembered Vaughan looking at her queerly, then he abruptly turned away to the door.

No previous trouble could be traced to either of the slain men. Lowman was a poultry raiser, with a family of nine children. Vaughan, a miscellaneous contractor, had been known to have an erratic disposition, manifesting itself in outbreaks of moodiness, during which time he suffered a "persecution complex." He had a wooden leg. Both men had good business records.

Carried Pivotal Around

For a week previous to the murder, Mrs. Vaughan told a Register-Guard reporter, Vaughan had carried a pistol about, having threatened to "get Lowman if our paths ever crossed." Vaughan was in the store early Saturday morning, remaining until about 10 o'clock. Storekeepers said he appeared in good spirits.

Gordon Reed, a salesman, driving slowly towards Lowell, few minutes after the shooting, said he saw Vaughan walking to his home, and waved. Vaughan did not look either way, but walked on without answering.

An unidentified boy testified to hearing the shot at the Vaughan residence.

Within a few minutes after the murder, a large group gathered at the store, and remained until the bodies were taken to Eugene. Mrs. Lowman came to see the body of her husband, but was turned away by state police. She was taken to a neighbor's house. Mrs. Vaughan remained at her home with relatives.

State Police Arrive

State police did not arrive on the scene until 2:45 o'clock, with Coroner Charles Poole arriving shortly after.

Vaughan, who was reported to be about 55 years of age, has lived in this section of Lane county practically all of his life. Lowman, whose age was given at about 50, came here several years ago.

The bodies are at the Poole chapel pending further announcements and obituary.
