METHODISTS MAKE NEW APPOINTMENTS

LA GRANDE, Ore., Aug. 3.—(Special)—Announcement of appointments to pastors for the coming year marked the concluding session of the annual northwest conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, here last night.

Rev. J. T. Croot of Richland, Ore., was transferred to Weston, Ore. Rev. E. Roy Fort of Weston was assigned to Corvallis, Mont.; Rev. Frank Sutton of Corvallis, Mont., was assigned to McFarland, Ore.; Rev. J. A. Hall of McFarland to Peoria, Ore.; Rev. J. E. Walbeck of Peoria to Julietta, Mont.; Rev. Mr. Hartfield of North Carolina, was assigned to Richland, Ore.; and Rev. W. B. Smith of Bandon, Ore., to Noxon, Mont. All other pastors were returned to their same charges.

Bishop James Cannon Jr., bishop of the church with headquarters in Los Angeles, preached the concluding sermon on the subject, "What Is the Truth with Regard to the Liquor Question?" He gave a resume of conditions both before and after repeal and declared that conditions are worse now than before repeal. Bishop Cannon issued a strong charge to the church to take the lead in bringing the truth to the people of the liquor conditions and in the campaign for the return of prohibition.

The 1937 conference will be held in Spokane, the dates to be announced later by the bishop.

Professors Dated To Address Rotary

Two especially interesting programs have been arranged for the Eugene Rotary club's meetings Tuesday and the following Tuesday. The club meets at the Osburn hotel, Tuesday noons.

Dr. Warren D. Smith of the University of Oregon geology department is to be the speaker Tuesday, his topic being "The Drive For Peace." Among other things, Dr. Smith is to discuss the international planks in both major political parties.

On the following Tuesday, Dr. Edward P. Cheyney of the University of Pennsylvania, noted historian and chairman of the committee from the Social Science Research Council of America on academic inquiry, will give the address, his topic to be "Freedom of Academic Inquiry." Dean Wayne L. Morse is chairman for this month's program in the club.

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15 WARSHIPS VISIT PORTLAND HARBOR

PORTLAND, August 3. — (AP) — The Willamette river bristled today with a squadron of the sea power of the American navy—15 trim fighting craft which steamed up the river Sunday and today in a summer visit to Oregon.

Wednesday six more fighting craft will anchor in the harbor to complete the squadron sent here in celebration of Fleet week. Some 6700 officers and enlisted men were aboard the vessels, which will remain here until next Monday.

The U. S. S. Chicago, flagship of the Pacific fleet, led the parade of navy greyhounds up the Columbia and Willamette rivers, Sunday, followed by the Houston, flagship of Vice-Admiral W. T. Tarrant, commander of the scouting force, the Chester, The Relief, hospital ship, Detroit, flagship of Rear Admiral C. H. Woodward, commander of destroyers, battle force, and eight slender, speedy destroyers.

The cruisers Omaha and Milwaukee arrived today.

Thousands of spectators lined the rivers as the craft proceeded from Astoria and Portland's bridge and harbor banks were jammed with people, many getting their first view of America's sea defenders.

Welcomed by Mayor Joseph Carson and a committee of 15, Admiral Tarrant remarked that the river trip was one of the most beautiful voyages he had made.

The passing sea greyhounds paid a tribute to the old battleship Oregon as they steamed abreast of her, a bugle sounding from the Houston and marines presenting arms, while the cruiser's band struck up "The Star Spangled Banner." Admiral Tarrant once commanded the Oregon.

The Houston was the same cruiser on which President Roosevelt visited here two years ago.
