RUSSIAN AIR HERO POISED FOR FLIGHT ALAMEDA AIRPORT, Alameda, Cal., Aug. 6.—(AP)—Discouraged by persistent motor trouble, Sigismund Levanevsky, Soviet air hero, today ordered his plane ready at 10 a.m. for a hop to Seattle on his projected flight to Moscow from Los Angeles, but indicated he may abandon the flight before he leaves the continent.

Levanevsky expressed dissatisfaction with his single-motored Vultee seaplane when he arrived here with his flying companion, Victor Levchenko.

"We have had much minor trouble and I have not made up my mind entirely to go through with the project," he said "We will decide when we have covered one-third of the flight." Scheduled stops in their itinerary include Seattle, Juneau, Fairbanks and Nome.
