Former Top-Flight Swimmer Says
Amateur Athletics Don't Pay Off;
Fun Goes When Formality Sets In

HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Aug. 6.—(AP)—A pretty, dark-haired girl, sitting on a movie studio "set" today, was reading the news from Berlin about the Olympic games. Finally, she put the newspaper away, and said: "I'm glad I'm out of it."
The girl, Olive Hatch, formerly a top-flight swimmer. She's in the movies now.
"There are three good reasons why," she explained.
"In the first place, I've got a real career, I believe. Besides, a woman athlete can't come back. It's hard enough for a man, and virtually impossible for a woman."
"And finally, because I don't believe you get value received from amateur athletics once you reach the top brackets."
"Take Eleanor Jarrett's case. They gave her a poor deal. Eleanor is the sort of person who takes one drink and can have a regular explosion of fun on that. She makes it look a lot worse than it really is."
"Yet, in spite of all her work, and the sacrifices in time that this sort of thing is bound to require, she's off the team. That's typical of formalized amateur athletics. It becomes a career, in itself, and without real rewards."

AIRLINER FALLS;
8 MEN ARE DEAD
NOTED RADIO TEAM
INVITED TO EUGENE

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 6.—(AP)—All eight persons aboard a Chicago and Southern Airlines plane were killed in an unexpected crash near Lambert-St. Louis airport last night. The wreckage, strewn through a plowed field for 200 yards, was not found until early today almost four hours after the plane plunged to the ground. Investigators seeking the cause had the ship's intact instruments and the story of an eye-witness to add them.
Carried to their deaths were: W. S. Bartlett, Chicago; C. B. Wright, 18, Hinsdale, Ill.; D. R. Davitt, Chicago; George Oshaber, Chicago; A. R. Holt, Boston; Vernon C. Omlie, Memphis; Carl Zier, Chicago, the pilot; Russell Mossman, New Orleans, the co-pilot.
Searchers found the bodies of the pilot and co-pilot, their arms locked about each other, about 50 feet from part of the wrecked cabin.

HAMILTON BLAMES
F. D. R. FOR LOSS OF
SMALL INVESTORS

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Republican National Chairman John D. M. Hamilton said last night that under the Roosevelt administration, "a democracy of thirty million investors" in railroads had been dissipated and power concentrated in the hands of "economic royalists" and "princes of privilege."
When President Roosevelt spoke in Salt Lake City in 1932, Hamilton said, he "pointed out that nearly five billion dollars of railroad bonds are owned by banks and insurance companies."
Roosevelt admitted, the speaker added, that bonds were "owned by the millions of policyholders and savings bank depositors."
Roosevelt Admits Ownership
"I would emphasize that at the end of 12 long years of republican administration, even Mr. Roosevelt said our railroad industry was owned by 30,000,000 people."
"Let's look at the condition in 1936. A new despotism of 'economic royalists' and 'princes of privilege' has arisen, a small group which has concentrated into its own hands—and I use the president's own words: 'An almost complete control over other people's money, other people's labor, other people's lives.'"

JARRETT MAY SUE
OLYMPIC LEADERS

BERLIN, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The Eleanor Holm Jarrett case may be closed as far as the American Olympic committee is concerned, but the band leader husband of the swimming star says he intends to take legal action against the committee.
Balked in his efforts for a conference with Chairman Avery Brundage on his wife's dismissal from the Olympic team for drinking and violating training rules, Arthur Jarrett announced he would take "the proper steps" on returning to New York.
In a statement last night, after he was informed by Brundage there was nothing further to add in the case, Jarrett announced his plans.

Nazis Whistle
At Vault Star

BERLIN, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Earl Meadows, American winner of the pole vault title, received applause mingled with whistles when he mounted the victory stand for the Olympic ceremony today. The Californian saluted in military fashion as the Star Spangled Banner was played.
The whistling—a German version of the raspberry—made its appearance during the pole vaulting yesterday when each American was greeted in this way. The Japanese received cheers.

CRABILL RITES
HELD THURSDAY

Funeral rites for the late F. M. Crabill, widely known show man and manager of the Hellig and Mayflower theatres, who died Tuesday, were held Thursday afternoon, in Veatch chapel, attended by a large group of friends from all callings.
The chapel was banked with many floral pieces, flowers being sent from many friends in Portland, Denver, Salem, and other outside points. Mr. Crabill was known throughout the coast and west section as "the grand old man of the show business." One huge floral tribute, an all-white one, was from theatre associates in Portland.
Pallbearers were Otto Schmidt, theatre man from Salem, Ore.; Ed Mapel, who operates a theatre in Denver, Colo.; Alonzo Spencer, Clarence Urey, J. H. McKinley, and E. G. Boehnke, all of Eugene.
Rev. Cecil F. Ristow, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church, gave the sermon. The body is being sent to Portland for vault entombment in the East 14th and Bybee mausoleum, the commitment service to be at 10:30 a. m. Friday.
In respect to the memory of Mr. Crabill, the Hellig and Mayflower theatres were closed all afternoon until 6 p. m. Thursday.

Report On Hourly
Earnings Not Good

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The national industrial conference board reported today hourly earnings in 25 industries increased .3 per cent in June over May and weekly earnings increased .9 per cent. This advance, it said, was more than offset by the rise in the cost of living, with the result that the real weekly earnings declined .6 per cent.

GERMAN OFFICER
TOPS PENTATHLON

BERLIN, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Gotthard Handrick, oberleutnant in the German air force, today won the modern pentathlon championship of the 11th Olympic games as American contestants finished second, seventh and ninth.
Handrick finished with the low total of 51.5 points. Charles F. Leonard of St. Petersburg, Fla., completed the five event test in second place with 59.5 points.
Alfred D. Starbird of Burlington, Vt., was seventh with 67.5 and Lieut. Fred Weber of West Point, N. Y., ninth with 78.
Leonard, third in the aggregate standing after the first four events, caught and passed Sven Thofelt of Sweden in today's final test, a 4,000 meter cross country run. Leonard finished tied for seventh in this event in 14 minutes 15.8 seconds, while Thofelt, finishing 24th in the run, dropped back into fourth place in the final standings.
Starbird also made a magnificent showing on the final day. He ran a marvelous 4,000 meter race although suffering from a foot injury, finished in a tie for seventh place with Leonard, and then had to be carried to the Olympic village for medical treatment.
Handrick failed to win a single first place during the five-day competition but made by far the most consistent showing in all events.
Leonard won the pistol shooting, was sixth in the swimming, tenth in fencing and 15th in riding in addition to gaining sixth place in the run.

BEES LOSE SECOND
AS OTT GETS BRACE

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The Giants made it two straight over the Boston Bees yesterday, 8-4. Mel Ott hitting a brace of home runs for the second successive day. The St. Louis Cardinals made it two in a row over the Cubs, 4-1, behind Roy Parmelee's five-hit pitching. Brooklyn defeated Philadelphia, 7-3. Cincinnati defeated Pittsburgh, 6-4, in a night game.
The New York Yankees held their 11-game lead in the American league, defeating the Boston Red Sox, 7-2, as runner-up Cleveland defeated Detroit, 6-4, in 10 innings. The St. Louis Browns walloped Chicago, 16-4, in the first game of a doubleheader. They were deadlocked 9-9 in the nightcap when rain routed them after the seventh inning. Philadelphia defeated Washington, 9-6.

Shotgun Tourney

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 6.—(AP)—The top flight of the west's best shotgun marksmen today began competition for the titles and \$4,000 prize money in the annual Pacific International Trapshooting association championship and handicap.
Two hundred gunners from a dozen western states will compete at the eight traps of the Portland Gun Club in the first of the official events today—the class championships—after beginning the five-day meet yesterday in the practice rounds. Most have attained a length of eight inches.
