WESTPORT, Wash., Aug. 7.—(Special)—Adrift since June 29 when she broke her crankshaft in Unimak Pass, Alaska, the halibut boat Baldy was rescued 15 miles off shore by the coast guard life-saving crew late yesterday. Capt. John Bertone of San Francisco and his crew of two had six gallons of water and a week's rations left, they said. H. J. Persson, commander of the Westport life-saving station, who directed the rescue, said the three mariners were in good spirits and showed little ill effects from the mishap. He estimated they had drifted 2,000 miles since the breakdown. The Westport guardmen found the Baldy today after the crew at the Quillayute station had searched vainly all yesterday. The drifter had been reported sighted yesterday by the coastal steamer Yaquina.
