PILCHARD TROUBLES

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 10.—(AP)—
The Pacific Coast fisheries institute
said today that Puget Sound and Ore-
gon fishermen will petition Columbia
fishermen to accept a \$9-per-ton price
on pilchard rather than forego their
catches. The \$10 price was fixed by
California pilchard fishermen at
Monterey in June, with the result that
seven floating reduction plants are
tied up in San Francisco Bay.

GROVE MAY SEEK POWER ARBITERS

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

In writing of the procedure to be
taken in bringing about the reduc-
tions and would be called upon to file
a report of the minutes of its meet-
ing, audited expense account, findings,
recommendations, etc., with the city
council, the Mountain States Power
company, the Business Men's Alliance,
and the public utilities commissioner,
these reports to be in by November 1.

Expense to Be Divided

The alliance plan would call upon
the city council, as the representative
body of the people, to pay one-half of
the expenses shown in the audited re-
port of the commission, the Mountain
States Power company as "receiving

the benefits of this investigation," to
pay the other half of the expenses.
Action of the alliance in presenting
these resolutions follows the elec-
tion held last week when the plan to
allow the city to renew the franchise
of the Mountain States Power com-
pany was turned down by the voters
in a near 5 to 1 decision. The Busi-
ness Men's Alliance was the group
sponsoring the opposition movement
to granting the franchise again.

The action of the alliance Monday
is the "first move" made in the situ-
ation since the election.
City Recorder L. W. Coiner stated
the letter from the alliance had been
received Monday, but said he had no
statement to make. The city council is
not expecting to hold any special
meeting, the next regular session to
come in early September.

COUNCIL MAY NAME MORSE SUCCESSOR

Appointment of a new member to
the civil service commission is ex-
pected to be forthcoming Monday eve-
ning as the city council holds its reg-
ular monthly session at the city hall,
beginning at 7:30 p. m.

Although city officials declined to
comment Monday, the name of Charles
Edwards was prominently mentioned
as a likely candidate to succeed Dean

Wayne L. Morse, who resigned from
the commission on account of resi-
dence ineligibility. During the interim,
the other two members of the board,
Paul D. Green and Roy Morse, have
continued to collect data on local civil
service problems.
Councilmen will also hear a re-
quest from the Eugene hospital to
place a "quiet" zone around the estab-
lishment. Sale of city-owned property
is not expected to come up, while the
council will let the city water board
controversy rest pending a joint meet-
ing August 24.

The school and water boards will
also hold their monthly meetings, each
beginning at 7:30 o'clock.
