

ZIONCHECK BURIED WITH MUCH POMP; HUGE ATTENDANCE

SEATTLE, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The neighbors and friends whose votes sent Marion Anthony Zioncheck to congress and whose cohesiveness on his return contributed partially to the motive for the young congressman's suicide leap turned out today amid government pomp to pay him final respects.

While the body of the once promising young legislator lay in state at the Evergreen funeral home, plans were completed for one of the largest funerals seen in the Pacific northwest.

He was accorded full military rites, to which he is entitled by virtue of his office. The services were held at 1:30 p. m. and burial was in Evergreen Memorial cemetery.

One hundred U. S. sailors from Bremerton navy yard, accompanied by a band, sailed by special tug for Seattle at 11:30 a. m. The company comprised a color guard, honor guard and band.

FREE SPEECH HELD CURE FOR "REDS"

Application of a little of the old fashioned American freedom of speech in bringing communism out in the open and discussing it freely; as well as recognizing as one of our necessities the establishment of old age security, and, thirdly, taking a more sympathetic attitude toward trade unionism in this country, were outlined as means to overcome our fear that communism threatens us, by Dr. Edward P. Cheyney of the University of Pennsylvania, in a talk for the Rotary club luncheon, Tuesday noon.

Dr. Cheyney is chairman of the committee on academic inquiry from the Social Science Research Council of America and in his talk Tuesday highlighted some of the work of that committee.

The fear of communism is a baseless fear; yet the threat is a genuine and serious one, noted in many forms, he said, adding, that the danger lies in the fact that this fear of communism will be used as an excuse to refuse freedom of meeting and assembly, and of speech, and discussion.

The committee he is working with at the present is making a study of the reports of the increase in the tendency for restriction of the freedom of speech and discussion. Reports here and there are coming in that certain views are restricted from use of the radio, that some men have been removed from college and university faculties because of differing views, that meetings have been prevented, etc. This type of thing is something Americans do not like. The committee is seeking to find if there is an increase in this tendency and if there is threat of even greater increase, Dr. Cheyney said. He gave his view that he was inclined to believe the situation is not any worse than it has been, but that the threat is the more serious situation. From here on he went on to discuss the fear of communism and how that fear could be used to refuse freedom of meeting and speech on the grounds that in that way communism could be restrained.

It was this kind of fear that was used by Hitler, and Mussolini; and more recently in the Greek situation, the speaker pointed out, adding, also, the statement that in Spain effort is being made to overthrow the government because it is supposed to be sympathetic to communism.

In America, the communist party

has a very small membership and there is no apparent increase in the party, Dr. Cheyney said. He stated that did not mean, however, that more could not join and that the party could not grow, but there are other tendencies that lead us to believe the communists are not going to gain rapidly in this country. Trade unions, for one thing, do not approve communism. The new parties coming to life do not take up the communist principles; nor is there a single serious person who sees communism have any prospect of gaining, the speaker continued.

From there on the speaker went on to explain how the fear of communism could be overcome by being sure the nation provides adequately for its aged, that it treats trade unionism sympathetically, thus guaranteeing American democracy, and by allowing free discussion on communism and its principles. People ought to know what communism is. It is a plan of life, a plan of society, a group of ideas. "Ideas have to be heard," he commented, pointing out the wisdom of bringing communism out in the open. If it is regarded as something to be hushed up, restless souls are going to get wrong ideas and wonder why it can't be talked about, he stated.

Dean Wayne L. Morse introduced the speaker. Dr. Cheyney is visiting his nephew, Dr. Harry B. Yocum of the University of Oregon faculty.

Four new members, Guy Wright, P. M. Morse, A. West Johnson, and Philip Gent were inducted into the club, Tuesday.

Big Klamath Drum Corps Will Parade Wednesday Morning

TRUCKERS REPORT

HAMILTON FAVORS BONNEVILLE AND OTHERS OF WORTH

PORTLAND, Aug. 11.—(AP)—John D. M. Hamilton, chairman of the republican national committee, when asked today what the attitude of the London forces, if elected, would be toward such unfinished projects as Bonneville dam, said no deserving work would be stopped.

Asserting that reclamation and conservation had been inaugurated by Theodore Roosevelt and that all programs had been laid out by the republican administration, he said Gov. Landon will provide a much better business administration of Bonneville than President Roosevelt. The \$42,500,000 Bonneville project is being constructed on the Columbia river to improve navigation and provide power.

Hamilton, arriving here on an airplane tour of the west to confer with party leaders, told a press conference that the difference between himself and James Farley, Democratic national chairman, "is that Farley has six or seven states down south that he can fairly depend on and I am not hunting a political job and he is."

Hamilton's remark followed one in which he said the republicans were not "conceding" any states to Roosevelt. He attacked reciprocal trade treaties at the press conference, asserting they have cost Americans their Canadian markets and are building up surpluses of American products. He predicted Oregon dairy farmers would find, as Wisconsin farmers had, that the Canadian treaty seriously affected their business.

Hamilton said that Canadian exports of cattle were not principally "feeder" cattle but were slaughter products, contrary to the treaty.

SPANISH REBELS OPEN BIG DRIVE

throughout the San Sebastian-Irun area. Bitter hand-to-hand fighting took place on the mountainsides facing Oyarzun, shell-wrecked community seven miles southeast of San Sebastian, from which foreign diplomats resident there for the summer were forced to flee less than a fortnight ago.

The rebel offensive in the north, which if successful will achieve a dual purpose—destruction of loyalist control on Spain's northern seaboard, and the opening of an avenue to the sea for rebels in need of arms and ammunition—was launched during a period of quiet on the Guadarrama front.

The ultimate strategy of Gen. Francisco Franco's Moroccan troops striking north and northeastward is to join hands with Gen. Emilio Mola's drive from the north on Madrid and encircle the capital city in an attempt to smash the leftist regime.

Government bombardment of the historic old capital of Granada already has begun, reports from southern rebel headquarters declared.

Shells from leftist artillery were reported to have fallen on the Alhambra, famous 14th century palace of Moorish kings. The Alhambra stands on a hill overlooking Granada.

Nut Growers Start Their Annual Tour

CORVALLIS, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Western nut growers will turn their

attention to such matters as contrasting methods of cultivation in nut orchards, methods of guarding against and overcoming winter injury, and latest developments in walnut blight control tomorrow and Thursday when the Western Nut Growers' association holds its annual summer tour. The tour will start six miles west of Newberg at Ewing Young's school at 9:30 a. m. In general, walnut plantings will be viewed the first day and filberts the second. Anyone interested in nut growing may join in the trip.

would be declared unconstitutional. These view the legislature's act as a tongue-in-cheek enactment, "passing the buck" to the cities.

Adding further to the complications surrounding the situation, was the likelihood that in view of the probable unconstitutionality of the statute, the League of Oregon Cities would embark upon an intensive research of ball-and-pin machine control, with recommendations. The league had earlier been mentioned by a Lane county legislator, C. F. Hyde, as a possible approach to uniform adjustment.

While city and state officials were wrestling with the legal aspects of the situation, the church element, represented by the brotherhood of the Bethany Evangelical church, entered the issue with two resolutions supporting the efforts to deal with the gambling problem here and in Salem.

The resolutions, passed Monday evening, follow:

(1) To the city council of Eugene: "Resolved that we congratulate the city council of Eugene on their decision to tighten up on the gambling problem of this city, and we hereby pledge them our moral support."

(2) To Ralph E. Moody, assistant attorney general: "Resolved that we congratulate you on your courageous stand against gambling devices in the city of Salem, which should be an encouragement and a challenge to other parts of the state to go and do likewise."

urer \$120 annual salary, and the city attorney, \$50 annually, with a maximum of \$100; negotiate with Mountain States Power company to reduce the \$3420 account; cut election expenses; limit emergency expenditures to those only absolutely necessary.

Mayor Waltman gave out a statement as follows: "I do not need to point out the results if we refuse to take a firm position to bring about these savings, and I do not care to comment on the disastrous results of a refusal to adopt measures to cut down expenditures and reduce the indebtedness. I shall consistently oppose all expenditures as far as the same can be legitimately avoided."

His program would cut the city's functions down to the minimum, and leave the city administration in the hands of the council.

Opponents of Waltman's plan pointed out Tuesday, however, that he was a member of the budget committee that in 1935 voted a return to the highest expenditures since the 1932 cut.

Hugh Joliff, Springfield fire chief, whose department is vitally affected by the proposed program, declared that the plan would cost the city more in the way of additional insurance rates than it would save through taxation economy. "From the standpoint of the department, the program won't accomplish any savings," Joliff said.

Meanwhile, officials of the Civic club, proposed recipients of the city library and all its expenses, came out with statements denying that the club ever had any intentions of accepting the library responsibility. "It's too expensive, and Mr. Waltman has made no arrangements to consult us on the matter," Mrs. Edward Privat, president of the club, declared Tuesday.

The proposal was tabled for the September council meeting.

KLAMATH FALLS, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Happy times loomed ahead for Klamath Basin potato and barley growers today as United States department of agriculture estimates showed huge national shortages in the two crops. County Agent C. A. Henderson estimates that the Klamath potato crop will amount to 4,692,000 bushels, the highest in history, and believes there will be a repetition of the barley boom of 1934. It has been reported that potato growers willing to contract ahead of time have been offered as high as \$1.50 per 100 pounds.

PORTLAND, Aug. 11.—(AP)—H. G. Mook, vice-president and sales chief of the Plymouth Motor corporation, Monday told salesmen of Portland that high-pressure salesmanship has gone the way of the horse and buggy. Mook declared that pressure selling had never led to anything but dissatisfaction and that real salesmen have come to realize that a transaction does not end when a buyer pays his money.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 11.—(AP)—United States Senator Frederick Steiwer returned to Portland Monday from a conference with Governor Alf Landon in Topeka, and a campaign conference in Denver. Steiwer was optimistic for the Republican ticket's chances, expressing the opinion that the Lemke vote and the veteran vote would both contribute heavily toward success for the G. O. P.

ASTORIA, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Authorities hunted today for identification of the body of a man clad in working clothes, found in Big creek near here by Walter Graham. No clue to his identity was found in the clothing.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 11.—(AP)—A Portland man owed his life to the resourcefulness of a telephone operator. "You don't know it but I'm going to commit suicide," a voice said over the phone to a newspaper switchboard girl. "Oh, is that so? What's your number out there?" she asked. He gave it. A few minutes later a police patrol found the man in a basement, gas flowing from a nearby jet. He was fined \$5 on a disorderly conduct charge.

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 11.—(AP)—Portland's new super-airport won't cost much less than \$3,000,000 but the city won't have to put up anything outside of its original \$500,000 investment for the site, it appeared today. J. J. Karstetter, district WPA director, said he would forward to Washington an application for an additional \$1,500,000 and commented that he expected no difficulty in obtaining approval for the grant. A previous allocation totaled

\$1,300,000. Nine hundred men are employed on the project.

MILTON, Ore., Aug. 11.—(AP)—J. H. Samuel of Milton, injured in a shotgun accident Sept. 29, failed to rally from the wounds and died in a Walla Walla hospital. His gun was discharged, the shot striking him in the forehead, when he fell from a ladder while hunting pigeons in his barn. The widow, a son and two brothers survive.

Mr. Griffin was born on Bear creek, in the Cloverdale district, east of Creswell and has lived in Lane county practically all his life. He has seen the county grow from a sparsely settled wilderness to a thickly populated and rich farming and industrial section and has seen Eugene develop from a wide expanse of prairie into the third city in size in the state.

Mr. Griffin's parents were in the famous lost immigrant train in 1853. They first settled below Lowell, where Pengra is now located, and lived in different parts of the county after

that. Mr. and Mrs. Griffin were married on the way across the plains in Missouri. W. H. Griffin was 10 years ago and before coming to Springfield.

Oregon Seed Crops Find Rising Demand

CORVALLIS, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Oregon will probably be called on to supply a larger proportion of the country's field seed crops than usual because of wide drought conditions. E. E. Loefer, extension agronomist at Oregon college, said today, in many areas the drought area have been so badly hit that seed crops are being raised, which has a virtual monopoly on best grass, as not expected to be affected as much.
