OREGON'S WOOL CROP IS UNDER NORMAL FIGURE

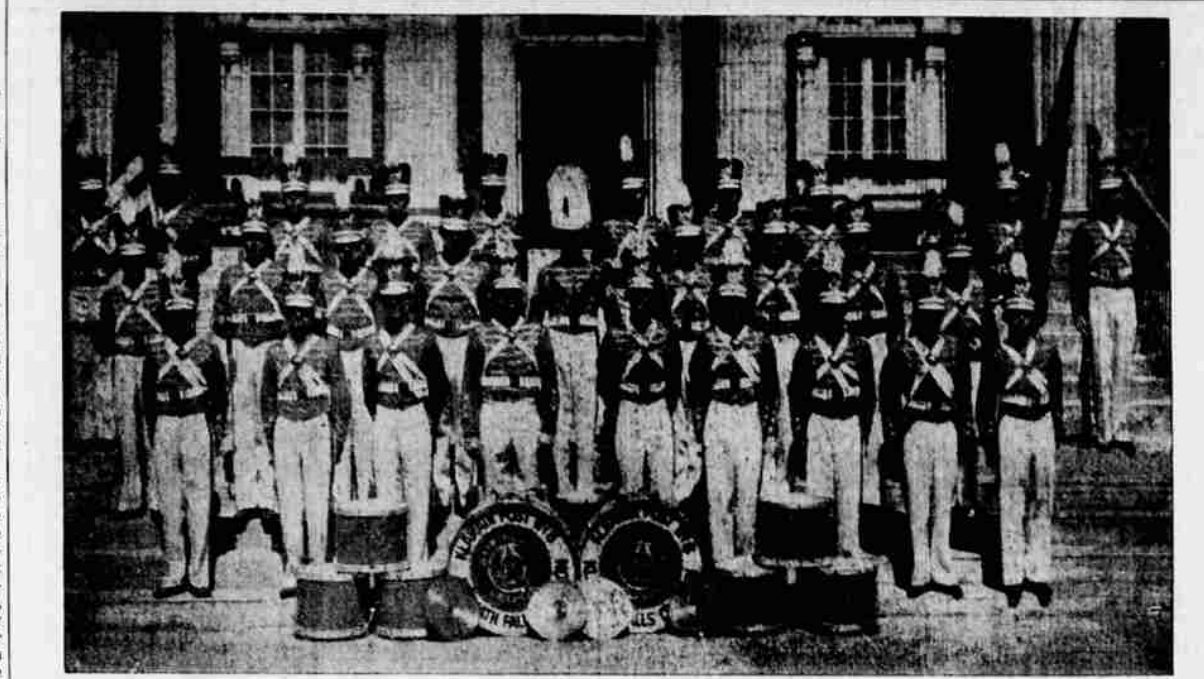
PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 12.—(AP)—Preliminary estimates of the department of agriculture released today indicate that Oregon's 1936 wool production will be slightly less than in 1934 or 1935.

The estimated figure for this year is 18,715,000 lbs., as compared to 19,088,000 last year and slightly more in 1934. The weight per fleece this year is estimated 8.6 lbs. against 8.7 for each of the two previous years. An estimated 2,330,000 head of sheep will be shorn this year whereas 2,263,000 were shorn last year and 2,280,000 the year before.

The lamb crop report of the department, also released today, showed the number of breeding ewes in the state to be the heaviest this year in some time. The total approximated 1,880,000 as compared to 1,855,000 last year and 1,865,000 in 1934. The number of lambs docked was 1,579,000, more than last year but considerably less than the previous year. 84 per cent were ewes, the same proportion as last year. In 1934 the percentage was 91.

The report revealed that winter ewe losses in Oregon were light this year, but there had been some loss of early lambs. Late lambs were said to have done well. Lambs were reported good, with a good crop of feed on the lower ranges.

TRIANGLE LAKE MAY GET FISH LADDER

A survey of the outlet of Triangle Lake will soon be made by the state game department so that an estimate of the cost of installing a fish ladder may be had, according to a letter received Wednesday by County Judge Fred Fisk from E. B. Wire, state game supervisor. Judge Fisk wrote the commission a few days ago, asking that something be done to blast out the outlet and install a ladder so that ocean fish might enter the lake at low water.

During the summer time the water in the outlet is so low that fish cannot climb the falls and fishermen are deprived of the sport of angling for steelheads and other ocean fish that ascend Lake creek, the judge pointed out.

The reason the improvement has not been made before is because of a lack of funds, according to the letter written by Supervisor Wire.
