

# Price Of Wheat Fluctuates Here; Stock Market Hits Profit Taking

## CASCARA BARK IS UP ONE CENT IN EUGENE MARKETS

The price of wheat appears to be fluctuating daily in Eugene, the offer Thursday being 62 cents again, after the price had dropped 2 cents a bushel the day before.

New York grade of extra eggs, buying price, was down a cent a dozen, 25 cents being offered, but other prices remained steady.

Cascara bark is half a cent higher in the local market than it has been for some time past, buyers offering 6 cents a pound for it.

## Corn Prices Climb On Chicago Market

CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—(P)—Corn developed greater strength than wheat late today, and climbed to the highest prices since March 1929.

No. 2 white corn for immediate use scored nearly 3 cents a bushel overnight rise. Predictions by crop experts were current that if extra heavy rains were not received between now and spring another crop disaster in 1937 would be an absolute certainty.

Corn closed buoyant, at almost the day's top level, 1 3/4@2 3/4 cents above yesterday's finish. Sept. \$1.08 5/8@3/4, Dec. 90 1/4@3/8; wheat 1 cent to 1 5/8 up, Sept. \$1.11 7/8@1.12, Dec. \$1.11 3/4@7/8; oats 1/2@7/8 advanced, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 22 cents.

## EARLY ADVANCES CHECKED BY LOSS IN LATE SELLING

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—(P)—After striding forward under the leadership of Steel most of the day, the stock market teetered and fell back in the final hour as profit-taking orders came in its path.

Buying on shipment of dividends hoisted Sloss-Sheffield Steel preferred around 14 points in the last hour, while the common in late trading rose about 6 points. Vanadium got up more than 2 points at one time but had the advantage whittled away in part.

Case and International Harvester yielded ground in the final hour. Lehigh Valley, Elkhorn Preferred and other coal issues met liquidation.

Modest improvement in Santa Fe, Pennsylvania and Delaware & Hudson contrasted with limited losses in Southern Pacific and New York Central.
