S. P. PUTS BACK HARRISBURG AGENT

HARRISBURG, Aug. 13.—(Special)—Word has reached Harrisburg that the Southern Pacific company will put a full time agent here starting Aug. 15. The agent will be given a three-months' trial and will be kept on the job permanently if business justifies it. During the depression the company took off the agent here but the business outlook has improved to a point where it is willing to try again for the Harrisburg traffic. The local chamber of commerce recently took up the matter with the company. The agent is supposed to be here Aug. 15.

To Do Road Work

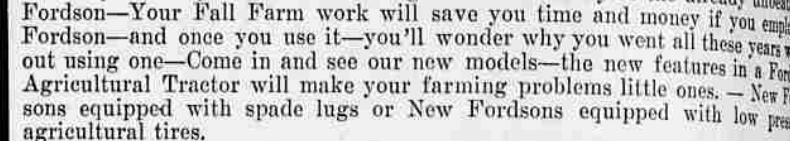
