Logging Road Work Said Progressing

DEERHORN, Aug. 14.—(Special)—A crew of men at work on the new logging road being built by the Booth-Kelly Lumber company south of the McKenzie river is making satisfactory progress. The road branches off from the county road near the Cane home and winds up the mountains through Cane's ranch, Willard Brown's, Matt Emmerick's and Fred Smith's with a grade of not more than eight per cent any place. Logs will be brought out on trucks and hauled to Springfield as soon as the road is completed. At present the men are felling timber and clearing brush and stumps in the right-of-way. Considerable blasting of rocks and stumps is necessary. Several bridges have already been built and piling is being driven for more. The county road has also been widened and graded by WPA labor. This is a great improvement over the narrow dangerous grade that farmers living on the south side of the river have traveled for many years.

The logging road will extend several miles back into timber never before touched. It has long been owned by Booth-Kelly who plan to operate many years. The company will also buy some logs from owners who hold timber that is made accessible by the new road.
