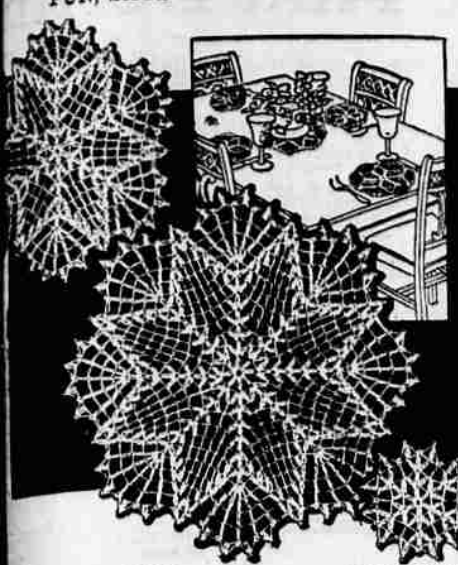


LACY DOILIES MAKE TABLE-SETTING FUN, SAYS LAURA WHEELER
