GEARHART, Ore., Aug. 21.—(AP)—Doc Near, Eugene's lone entry in the championship flight, came through with another smashing victory Thursday to enter the semi-finals of the men's under-32 division of the ninth annual Gearhart golf championships.

Near, former Eugene prep school ace, staged an uphill battle to defeat Dave Hanley of Pendleton at the 19th hole. Near won sweet revenge for Jim O'Connell, teammate, who was defeated by the Pendleton masher Wednesday.

Will defeated Art Ulmer, Gearhart medalist, yesterday by an 8 and 5 score, while Hedges was outing Vines, 2 to 1.

## GIANTS START ON CRUCIAL JOURNEY

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Bill Terry and his New York Giants open a 15-game road trip in Boston today that should make or break their hopes of capturing the 1936 National league pennant.

The Giants were idle yesterday, and saw the leading Cardinals increase their league lead to a game and a half as a result of whipping the Cincinnati Reds 4 to 2. It was Dixie Dean's 21st victory of the year, and the lanky right-hander helped win his own game, contributing one of his two singles in the ninth when the Cards scored three runs—their winning margin.

The third-place Cubs dropped a half game further behind the Giants when they were whipped 8 to 7 in an 11-inning struggle by the Pittsburgh Pirates. After blowing a seven run lead, the Cubs saw the game fade away in the 11th when Arky Vaughan connected for a single off Lou Warneke with the bases loaded, Arky's fourth hit of the day.

Boston's Bees went their series with the Philadelphia Phillies, two games out of three by taking the final game, 3 to 1.

In the only game scheduled in the American league, the Detroit Tigers whipped the St. Louis Browns, 8 to 4. Tommy Bridges doling out but eight hits for his 17th win of the year.

## STEELE WINS BOUT WITH KO IN SECOND

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 21.—(AP)—Using a blow that split his forehead from fingertip to wrist, Freddie Steele, world's middleweight champion, won his first battle as a champion here last night.

He knocked out Jackie Aldare, of Brooklyn, 61 seconds after the second round in a scheduled 10-round non-title fight began. Steele came into the ring at 10:05, Aldare at 10:22.

Aldare was a beaten fighter from the moment he stepped into the ring. Less than 30 seconds later, he was on the floor for a nine count after taking a series of hard lefts and rights to the body. He managed to hang on the rest of the round, making Freddie make a pair of right uppercuts to the face and getting in an effective blow or two himself.

In the second, he showed a momentary aggressive streak, covered quickly when Steele drove into his body again, then flopped to the canvas the last time from a long swinging right. The blow split Steele's right glove.

The fight, which drew some 3,200 persons, was held to fulfill a promise Steele made to George Shanklin, veteran promoter, before the Tacoma fighter took the middleweight title from Eddie (Babe) Risko in Seattle last month.

The unpredictable Coast league race, with six teams playing better than .500 baseball, was further snarled today.

Ed Wells yielded the Seals hits in every inning, while Win Ballou pitched smart ball, allowing eight hits only five of which went to the outfield. Hal Rhyne, Tony Borcia and Darry Woodall got nine of the Seals' 10 hits.

Manager Dutch Ruether was not allowed on the field at the start of the game because a league fine of \$50 remained unpaid. Bill Klepper, president of the Seattle team, produced the money—all in small change.
