

FEDERAL INCOME GREATER IN ALL KINDS OF TAXES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Increased federal income in every important category of taxation was reported today by the treasury in its survey of internal revenue collections for the first month of the 1937 fiscal year.

Income during July, the treasury revealed, rose \$94,728,904 above collections for the same month a year ago. The increase in some items amounted to several hundred per cent.

The total rose from \$221,597,633 in July of 1935 to \$288,326,539 for the same period of this year, an increase totalling almost 30 per cent.

Publication of the treasury figures recalled the statement issued last week by Secretary Morgenthau. After conferring with President Roosevelt and congressional finance leaders, the cabinet member said no additional taxation would be asked of the next congress.

Notable increases included: Gains of \$12,752,211 for taxes on liquor; rises from \$14,264,533 to \$20,065,923 from corporation income taxes; rises in individual income payments from \$9,598,000 to \$11,652,000; rises in excess profits taxes from \$174,000 to \$1,048,000; rises in estate taxes from \$14,224,000 to \$29,014,000; and rises from gift taxes from \$96,000 to \$327,000.

The taxes on bonds, issues of capital stock and conveyances yielded \$2,116,357 for the month last year and \$2,479,000 this year. Collections on automobiles reflected improved conditions in that industry, rising from \$3,089,000 to \$7,706,000.

SOLOMON'S ROLE BEING PLAYED BY CHILDREN'S BUREAU

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 21.—(AP)—The role of a "Solomon" in a double paternity problem of 10-year-old twin girls now in a Wheeling, W. Va., institution today was shifted by Mrs. Luetta MacRuder, chief of the state division of charities, to Miss Julia Griggs of the children's bureau here.

The mother of the twins, a Columbus woman whose name Mrs. MacRuder refused to reveal, has asked for their custody. The girls were placed in the institution by the father who was unwilling to allow his wife to have the children on the ground that another man is the father of one of the girls.

Obstetrical advice to determine whether the father's contention is possible was sought by the state division but authorities only said that while it could occur it would be difficult to prove.

It was pointed out that, although blood tests can indicate a certain individual could not have been the father, they do not establish the absolute identity of the father.

Independence Plans Big Hop Jambouree

INDEPENDENCE, Aug. 21.—(Special)—The coronation ceremonies for the queen of the Hop Fiesta, to be held here August 27 to 30 inclusive, will take place on the opening evening of the celebration. Mayor A. L. Thomas of Independence, will crown the Fiesta ruler, and an elaborate ceremonial will be presented under the direction of Paul Robinson, Mrs. Elsie Holt, and Mrs. Maurice J. Butler.
