**DeWitt C. Trotter**  
The funeral of DeWitt Clinton Trotter, who was found dead Thursday morning near Leaburg will be held at the Poole chapel in Springfield, Saturday at 2 p. m. The interment will take place in Mt. Vernon cemetery and Rev. Frank Cook, assistant pastor of the Christian church, will conduct the services.  
Mr. Trotter was born April 24, 1893, at St. Cloud, Minn., and grew to manhood there. At the age of 23 he went to Idaho and was married to Henrietta Ball at Princeton, in that state. They moved to Lane county in 1894. Mrs. Trotter died in 1902 and Mr. Trotter was married in 1908 to Miss Eliza Farnham of Waller ville. Mr. Trotter had been employed by the Eugene water board since 1909 and at the time of his death was patrolman on the city power canal on the McKenzie river.  
Survivors are the widow; a daughter, Mary Ellen Trotter, at home; a son, Edgar Trotter, at Waldport; a daughter, Mrs. Ed Soule, of Hoskins; five grandchildren; three brothers, Will and Luther, in Idaho, and George in Minnesota; two half sisters and one half brother in Minnesota.

**Committee Ignites Steamer to Reveal Seal Disaster Cause**  
NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Scientists aboard a steamer anchored in the James River, near Norfolk, Va., expected to complete this week an answer to the sailor's most dreaded problem—fire.  
Marine experts said that from the smoke-blackened cabins of the S. S. Mantasket, the test ship, will emerge a new era of marine construction by which the dangers of fire at sea virtually may be eliminated.  
For seven months the experts have been setting fire to the interiors of specially constructed cabins aboard the Mantasket, burning material representing beds, closets, cupboards, sheets, mattresses, rugs and passengers' clothing, then making careful calibrations of just what happened.  
The work is being done by a United States senate subcommittee.
