# TREASURE HUNTERS USE SAILING SHIP

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Aug. 21.—(AP)—There was a "yo-ho-ho and a bottle of rum" atmosphere and a general hostility to visitors around toothpick dock today as the ship Constellation waited for the moon ebb tide to cast off for the south Jersey seas. For the Constellation, Capt. Alvan Loesche commanding, is bound in search of a \$1,000,000 treasure and the Empire Marine Salvage and Engineering Corp., has spared nothing to give the voyage a proper tone. The Constellation is a four-masted schooner with a clipper hull and if the wind doesn't blow the Constellation doesn't move. She's one of the last big sailing ships on the Atlantic coast. The treasure the Constellation will hunt was reported to be in the bulk of a British ship sunk off Cape Charles while transporting a payroll to revolutionary war troops. It also was reported to be silver bullion in a ship that foundered during the Civil war and to be a chest of gems lost when a smuggler's sloop sank off a Maryland point.
