Chicago Wheat Firm As Canada Gets Rain

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Reports that rain in Canada would delay harvest work a week in some sections did much to give a firm undertone to wheat prices today.

Downpours of almost two inches were noted at some Canadian stations. Forecasts pointed to additional moisture over the week-end.

Wheat closed irregular, 1/2 off to 1/4 up compared with yesterday's finish, Sept. 112 7-8 113, Dec. 112 3-8 1-2, Corn at 3-8 decline to an equal gain, Sept. 112 1-4 3-8, Dec. 97 5-8 3-4, oats 1-8 1-2 advanced, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 10 cents.

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BUYING PACE SLOW WITH FIRM CLOSE; WEAK ISSUES BACK

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—War talk dwindled to a whisper in today's stock market and traders began quietly to replace commitments unloaded so hurriedly in the preceding session.

Although the buying pace was relatively slow, many of yesterday's weak issues came back fractions to 2 points and a few 4 or more. The close was firm. Transfers were around 300,000 shares. Business and industrial items were given a sustaining influence and financial observers suggested the market may have been "oversold."

Brokers' quarters found the overnight European news more to their liking and the optimistic interview of Thomas W. Lamont of the J. P. Morgan firm helped to allay fears of a general foreign conflagration.

Second thoughts on yesterday's reports led some analysts to believe that part of the selling at least might have been due to the fact the market had reached a stalemate after four months of virtually uninterrupted advance and prices had discounted to a considerable extent fall improvement in business and industry.

BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, Aug. 22.—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—A fair volume of business was transacted in the Boston wool market during the past week, and prices on a number of grades showed a strengthening tendency.

Prices of fine territory wool, especially, tended quite firmly against buyers. Medium territory wools were more active, and prices of combing 3-8 blood advanced. Ohio fleeces were moderately active at steady to firmer prices in the range 35-38 in the grease for fine DeLaine and staple 1-2 blood, 38-39 cents for combing 3-8 bloods and 37-38 cents for 1/4 blood.
