FIRST TO FLY THE CHANNEL

THE Lindbergh of pioneer aviation, Louis Bleriot, died recently in Paris, aged 64. Twenty-seven years ago, this son of a French manufacturer, already a wealthy engineer and inventor, took the throttle in a crate-like machine that few would dare fly today, and crossed the English channel from Calais to Dover. It was a feat as daring and as historic in 1909 as was Lindbergh's lone crossing of the Atlantic in 1927.

Bleriot started building and flying airplanes in 1906. First by short-hops, then by longer cross-country flights, he distinguished himself in Europe as equally as did the Wright brothers in America. Then, on July 25, 1909, with a French destroyer assigned to "pace" him, he left Calais, out-distanced the warship, and reached Dover, England, a distance of 23.5 miles, in 38 minutes.

In 1934, on the 25th anniversary of this pioneering feat, France issued the stamp shown below. It pictures Bleriot's plane crossing the English channel.
