

RETAIL SALES OF OREGON LISTED IN MARKET HANDBOOK

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—(AP)—The commerce department today issued a 1936 market data handbook showing retail sales in Oregon during 1935 amounted to \$235 per capita, compared with \$204 for the nation as a whole.

The handbook, the department said, represented the first federal compilation of its kind ever made. Although the survey covered 1935 business, virtually the same ratios exist in the state today, the department said.

Retail sales in Oregon in 1935 totaled \$224,447,000, and wholesale sales \$202,146,000.

Cities and towns with populations in excess of 2500 accounted for \$178,966,000 of the retail volume, or \$305 per capita. The remainder, \$45,481,000 represented a per capita expenditure of \$98.

On 1930 Count
The figures were based on a 1930 population of 953,786, of which 489,746 was in cities with populations of 2500 or more.

In addition receipts of service, amusement and hotel businesses totaled \$22,540,000, cities of 2500 population or more accounted for \$19,507,000 of the aggregate.

The report listed 1934 postal receipts at \$4,506,000; tax returns on 1933 incomes numbered 28,494, or an average of 29.9 per 1000 population.

McMinnville High
McMinnville topped the list of the larger cities in retail sales per capita. Its figure was \$288, with a volume of \$1,710,000. Second was Roseburg, \$268 and \$2,455,000, and third, Tillamook, \$245 and \$1,890,000. Per capita and volumes for other cities were:

MECHANIC WHO BECAME A GREAT ARTIST



IN the Louvre, in Paris, hangs the famous Mona Lisa, portrait of a woman whose mysteriously smiling lips and devilish eyes have mystified the art world. In the refectory of the Santa Maria della Grazia cathedral in Milan hangs another great painting, depicting "The Last Supper." Both masterpieces are the work of a man who believed himself a better mechanic than artist—Leonardo da Vinci.

This genius, who lived from 1452 to 1519, had an abundance of brilliant ideas, but few ever came to completion. Besides the two great paintings, his famed works included a remarkable equestrian statue, which was destroyed later. He is believed to have drawn the first design for an airplane. He invented various engines of war and other mechanical devices. Even his sketches of



paintings he never completed are considered masterpieces.

In tribute to Da Vinci's thoughts of flight, Italy in 1935 issued a set of airmail stamps on one of which the great master is shown.

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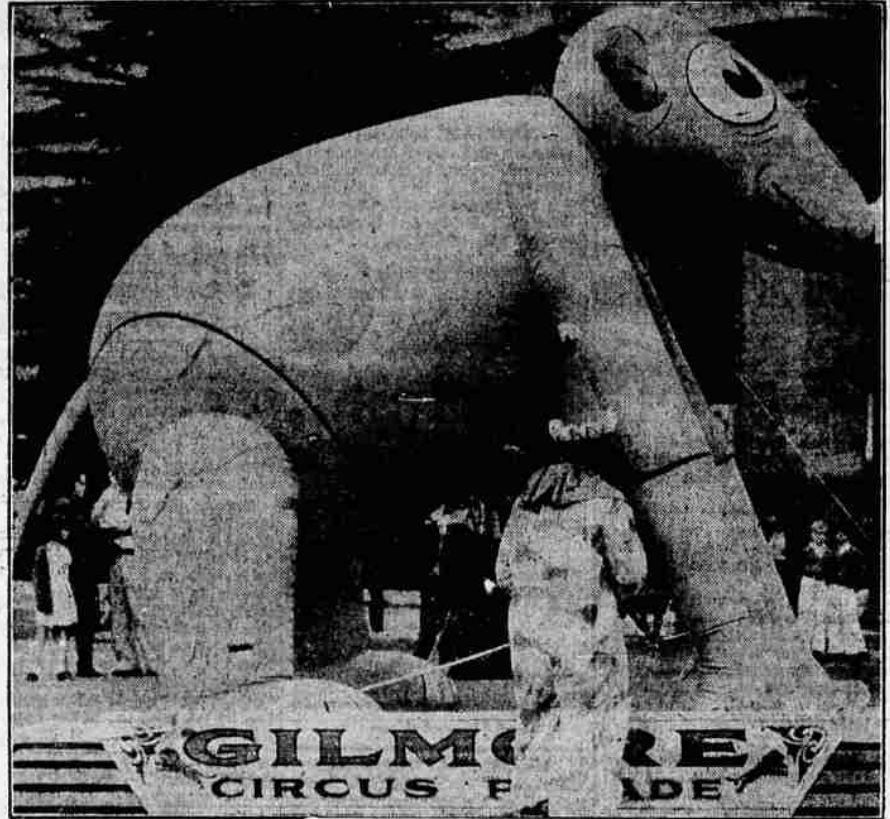
