

LOCAL G. O. P. PICKS EIGHT COMMITTEES, HEARS TOOZE SPEAK

Reporting that the republican party had come to life with a vengeance and that there was ever mounting enthusiasm in its Oregon ranks, Walter Tooze, assistant state central committee chairman, met with the Lane county central committee Wednesday afternoon and Wednesday night addressed a republican meeting at the Eugene hotel. He was accompanied by Lars Bladine, state committee secretary.

The two men have been on a tour of Oregon and have already visited 25 counties. They expressed themselves as elated by the vigorous and militant attitude they encountered among state adherents of the G. O. P. Tooze and Bladine journeyed Thursday to Linn county and will visit Benton county Friday and Lincoln county Saturday.

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became ill during an inspection of army engineer projects on the Delaware river in Pennsylvania.

Ill in April
In April he spent six weeks in the hospital after contracting influenza on a similar inspection trip down the Atlantic intra-coastal waterway. He was brought back to the capital by plane.

Although no announcement was made it was learned immediately after Dorn entered the hospital the last time that doctors entertained little hope for his recovery.

Specialists from Johns Hopkins hospital in Baltimore were called into consultation with the army medical center's staff in late July, but Dorn had become too weakened by the long fight he had made to respond to treatment.

President Roosevelt visited the ailing cabinet officer at the hospital shortly before departing on his mid-August inspection trip through the New York and Pennsylvania flood areas, and since that time has received frequent reports on Dorn's condition.

Despite his illness, Dorn began work early in August on his annual report. He consulted with General Malin Craig, chief of staff, and other department officials, but was unable to continue the work.

Hospital officials reported that Dorn was making progress toward recovery until, in mid-August, uremia developed.

Harry H. Woodring, assistant secretary, will assume the duties of acting secretary pending an appointment by President Roosevelt.

Simultaneously, orders were drafted for army posts throughout the country to lower their flags to half staff and to fire a mourning gun every half hour after reveille tomorrow. After the blowing of retreat tomorrow night, 30-gun salutes will be fired at all posts.

Sixty clowns headed by Otto Griebling, will furnish fun for the little folks.

There are 500 head of horses with the show this season including 200 performing equines. They will be in charge of Jack Joyce, famous horseman.

The "Serenade of Spain," an immense procession, will start the ball

rolling in the big show and will serve as a prelude to the main performance.

The doors to the combined menagerie will be opened at 1 and 7 p. m. The performances beginning at 2 and 8 p. m. A downtown ticket office will be in operation all day Friday at the Tiffany-Davis Drug store, and at the show grounds the white ticket wagon will be continuously accessible for the purchase of reserved seats. General admission tickets will go on sale at the red ticket wagon, simultaneously with the opening of the doors.

Dern's home state of Utah the president would attend.

The remainder of the trip necessarily would be delayed, including the Des Moines conference with Gov. Landon of Kansas and four other governors. Some of the other scheduled governor conferences might have to be omitted or consolidated, he said.

Roosevelt hopes conferences with federal and state officials, if his own drought committee, would point the way to the shift in the north-

west's economy he feels is essential to bulwark this region against future calamities of nature.

In denying at the start of the current dry spell that his administration would seek to depopulate areas hardest hit by recurring droughts, the president said the whole economy of this region must be changed, but with present populations kept where they are to carry on under the transformation.
