Building Done In National Forest

A BUILDING program totaling approximately \$16,000 is under way in the Willamette national forest, much of the program having been completed, some of it under way now and some units proposed, it was revealed by Perry A. Thompson, supervisor of the forest.

The program consists of buildings for storage purposes, residences, ranger stations and similar uses. Virtually all materials used in the construction of these buildings were purchased in Eugene.

In the city of Eugene the service has constructed an equipment and tool shed costing \$3,000, and a gas and oil station costing \$500.

An assistant ranger station was constructed at Cascade at a cost of \$2,500 and a ranger station was built at Big Fall Creek at a cost of \$2,000. A gas and oil storage building erected at Oakridge cost \$500.

At McKenzie Bridge a bunkhouse cost \$2,000 and farther down the river, at Blue River, a ranger station costing \$1,500 is under construction. Another ranger station went to Bret-enish hot springs, the cost set at \$1,500.

Before the summer season is over, the service will have completed a residence for the timber scaler at Westfir, the cost to be \$2,500.

In line with the forest service's program of finely constructed wood buildings, all these structures are of attractive appearance, built strongly and of durable native woods.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—How the building trades have benefited by the Federal Housing Administration's program is told in a letter to W. D. Flinders, deputy administrator, from Carl Blackstock of Seattle, representing the National Retail Lumber Dealers' association.

Mr. Blackstock wrote in part: "I would like to give you a comparison of the situation in the building trades now and three years ago. At that time carpenters and craftsmen of all kinds were standing ten deep in all our offices begging for employment; contractors were disgruntled and downhearted; and home owners were despairing of ever being able to pay their way out."

"Our own company had 26 houses on which the purchasers owed us upward of \$50,000. Our taxes were going on. The people who were living in these houses were unemployed. They couldn't or wouldn't pay, wouldn't get out, and the judges and sheriffs wouldn't put them out. We sold our last house of this lot the day before yesterday."

Building Activity Shows Increase

Speculative home-builders' operation and development company activities have broadened considerably during the last 15 months, according to L. Seth Schnittman, chief statistician of the F. W. Dodge Corporation, in an article in the April issue of the Architectural Record.

This activity has been credited by the author to the recognition by builders that a demand exists for an inexpensive, well-built house and to the activities of the Federal Housing administration in loosening the flow of credit in the mortgage fields.

"Liberalized financing is playing its part. Directly and indirectly, the Federal Housing administration plan of insured mortgages has afforded considerable stimulus to speculative building undertakings in the small-house field."

"The availability of first mortgage money for small houses on the basis of an 80 per cent ratio to the appraisal value, amortizing over a period of 20 years, has eliminated the need for junior financing. To be sure, not all small houses now being erected are financed under the Federal Housing administration's insured mortgage plan. This program, none the less, has impelled savings banks and state-chartered building and loan associations who are not operating on the insured plan to extend their terms to cover a 20-year amortization period on interest rates at least as attractive as those offered by institutions subscribing to the Federal Housing Administration plan."

Also last year for the first time a seminar in current law was held to familiarize the student with the most recent decisions of the Oregon supreme court and the United States supreme courts. The seminar was optional with no credit.

Two years ago the school achieved national recognition when a chapter of the Order of the Coif was installed. There are only 30 other colleges in the country which have such chapters. In November 1935, the Williams chapter of Phi Alpha Delta, national professional law fraternity, was revived on the Oregon campus. The chapter was first installed years ago when the law school was located in Portland.

When the library moved to its new position, the old library is to be remodeled into a modern law-school building, one of the most adequate on the Pacific coast. Plans for the new building include individual study offices for graduate students, as well as seminar rooms and library facilities for graduate work.

Barley Exports to Britain Gaining

SAN FRANCISCO.—(U.P.)—California barley is becoming an ever increasing ingredient in the malt that goes to make up the choice English ales and whiskies that Americans like to drink, according to the latest report of the Federal Agricultural Statistics department in California.

The increase in California barley exports to the United Kingdom, however, is only one element in development of the state's barley crop into one of its most important industries. The disposition of the crop, according to the statistics bureau, was greater the past year, than at any time since 1907-08.

California's barley crop for 1935-36 has been placed at 935,736 tons. Of this amount 819,054 tons have been disposed of, which is 18 per cent more



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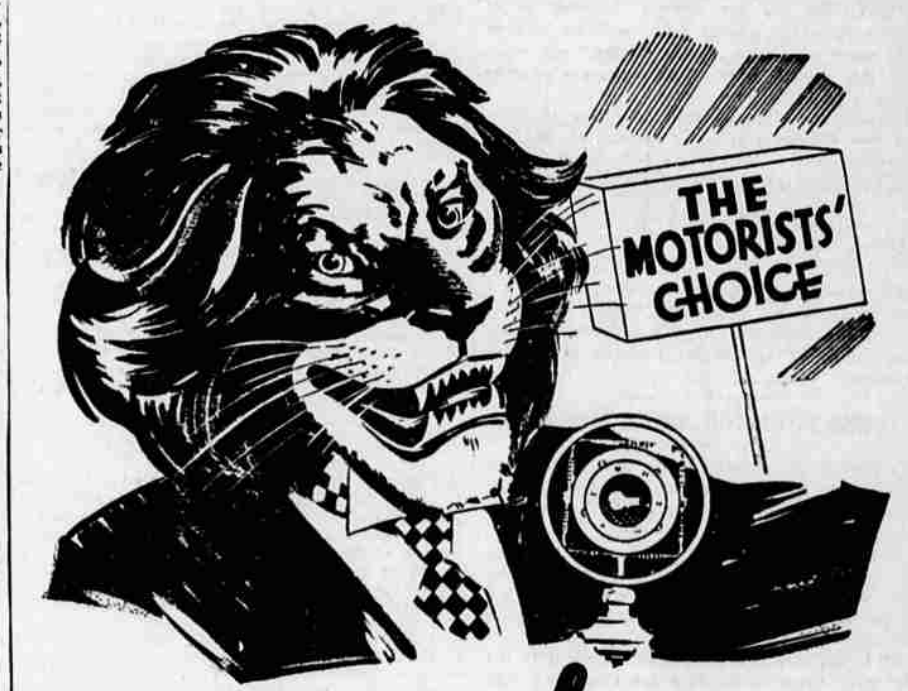


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
