PORTLAND BUTTER REPORTED SMALLER

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29.—(P)—There was little change in the dairy products situation locally for the weekend. Butter receipts and make were both reported as smaller than a week ago by the government bureau although there appeared more than plenty of cubes in sight to take care of every need of the trade.

Prices were easy in spots despite the alleged shortage in the output. As a rule churners say that supplies are holding up rather well.

Butterfat was unchanged at the weekend.

Weather conditions are against extensive egg market sales here.

More general weakness is suggested in the market for live chickens and especially light leghorns. Most operators now quoting the lower prices.

Complete demoralization of the local peach trade and price is reflected as a result of wrecking values on Yakima stock. These are being sold little above the cost of the packages and freight for the small stuff.

Pears from the Oregon coast are finding more favor with the trade here. Prices are steady.
