

COUNTY INSTITUTE OF RECREATION IS PLANNED IN EUGENE

A recreational institute will be held September 8, 9 and 11 for all persons in Lane county who are leaders in recreation or programs of any type in different organizations, according to announcement Monday by Miss Lois Lutz, county home demonstration agent.

Mrs. Gertrude Skow Sanford, former home demonstration agent here, now state specialist in recreation and dramatics, will direct the institute and she will be assisted by Miss Lutz.

The meetings will be held in the evenings, starting at 7:30 o'clock. Miss Lutz is asking each group to send from two to four leaders to the meetings and it is hoped that the same ones will attend throughout, as the meetings are of a continuous type.

The evenings of the 8th and 9th will be devoted to planning programs for recreation and other activities and on the 10th it is hoped these leaders will go back to their own communities and conduct similar meetings, using the ideas obtained at the two meetings of the institute. On the 11th when the last meeting of the series will be held questions regarding the work will be answered.

This is the one important meeting of this type to be held in the county this year, Miss Lutz pointed out.

All meetings of the institute will be held at Willamette grange hall.

Incident of that character will occur, navy department attaches said a commanding officer's first consideration was the protection of his ship and crew, and that he had full discretion to proceed in any manner he sees fit to insure that protection.

Should the judgment of any of the commanding officers of the five ships now in Spanish waters be that use of ship's guns is necessary in an emergency he has full authority to resort to such procedure.

It was said authoritatively that no hard and fast instructions have been sent along these lines to the vessels now in Spain.

The commanding officer of the Kane was said to have acted on his own judgment in returning the fire of the unidentified plane which dropped bombs near his ship and officers here generally praised his action as highly creditable.

Speculation was stirred in official and unofficial circles over the possible attitude of the United States government had the Kane been hit and damaged by one of the bombs, but officials declined to comment publicly.

There were private expressions of relief that the incident was not so serious as it might have been.

Officials Quick

Thus far the embassy at Madrid has not reported concerning a strong protest it was directed to make to the Spanish government, nor has the American consul at Seville, who was instructed to make similar representations to the commander of the rebel forces, advised the department as to the outcome.

The Kane was the target of six bombs and answered with nine rounds from its anti-aircraft gun.

The case was labeled as one of "mistaken identity."

KILLERS SOUGHT IN SISKIYOU REGIONS

The man-hunt over one of the most rugged regions in the United States, received reports the fugitives were heading for Mount Sterling on the California-Oregon line.

Possemen, who were warned the brothers carried rifles, flung lines across the seven roads leading to the high peak. Oregon state police aided in encircling the region from their side of the state line.

Deputy Sheriff Lange, whose skull was crushed by a rifle butt and body pierced by four bullets, played the leading role in attempting to block last year's lynching.

Alone at the jail, he was overpowered by the mob which seized Clyde L. Johnson August 3, 1935, and lynched him for the slaying of Chief of Police F. R. Daw of nearby Dunsmuir.

Baker, who fled for his life, told Sheriff Chandler he, and two officers and Captain Seaborn found the Britt brothers asleep under blankets beside Horse creek.

The assault complaint has resulted from an altercation the Britt had the previous day with Baker and Captain Seaborn over horse pasture.

Baker said John Britt resisted arrest and that Deputy Sheriff Lange hit him.

Coke Britt shot Constable Clark as he went to join Lange, Baker said. In the fight which followed, Lange was struck down by the clubbed rifle, the broken stock of which lay near his body, and shot through the face and head.

Captain Seaborn fell, with Lange's pistol clutched in his hand, as a bullet pierced his skull. No shot had been fired from the fully-loaded pistol.
