ARMITAGE REVEALS SPEED OF AIRMAIL

Eugene citizens may not realize it, but they now are only overnight from California cities, one-half business day from the Midwest and one business day from the Atlantic seaboard by means of fast and frequent air mail schedules, according to Postmaster Frank L. Armitage.

So that air mail users here may enjoy full benefits of the service, the postmaster announced closing times for letters destined both for the south and east. He pointed out that air mail frequently experiences unnecessary delay due to failure of citizens to post their correspondence in time to make connection with planes leaving the Pacific northwest. Those wishing to get air mail to California, the Midwest and east in the fastest possible time should see that their letters reach the post office not later than 4:20 p. m. Air mail thus posted for California will reach points as far south as San Diego before the opening of business next morning, while that going east will arrive in Chicago next afternoon and in New York that evening.

Postmaster Armitage called attention to the fact that air mail is less expensive and generally more effective than special delivery regular mail; also that air mail special delivery frequently can be used to advantage for mail scheduled to reach its destination after regular delivery hours.
