

STATE BOARD OF CONTROL HAS 'NO' SESSION AT SALEM

SALEM, Sept. 8.—(P)—The state board of control, under the leadership of Governor Martin, held a "no" session here today with all requests made going by the rejection route or referred to other departments.

Repeated refusals, particularly on the part of the executive, provoked the remark from Secretary of State Earn Snell: "Gosh, governor, you must feel tough today." He laughed in concurrence.

The request of Dr. J. M. Odell, superintendent of the Eastern Oregon Tuberculosis hospital to use a promised bequest of \$12,000 to construct a physician's residence and add to the nurses' home, was rejected for the present. The bequest will be due from the estate of Britanna G. Fulton, the board of control was advised. A similar bequest was made to the W. C. T. U. home in Benton county.

A claim for \$1,109.28 from the Portland open air sanitarium for the care of a tuberculosis patient was referred to the legislature, since the matter covered a previous biennium.

Governor Martin placed himself on record as opposing the purchase of any more new automobiles for state departments unless under unusual circumstances when the board rejected requisition of a land board automobile.

"The cost of state government is rapidly increasing and we must cut the corners," Martin said. The budget department has stated the requests of state institutions will run more than a million dollars in excess of the expenditures the past two years, he added.

Study of sewage disposal for state institutions in the Salem area was put before the state engineer with a request for recommendations.

Public Utilities Commissioner Frank McCulloch will appear before the board next Monday to outline his recommendations on reducing power, light and telephone costs in the various departments.

Members of the board will visit the Eastern Oregon hospital at The Dalles Thursday night and will attend the Pendleton round-up Friday, they reported today.

All state offices will close, in so far as constitutionally possible at noon tomorrow to permit employees to attend the state fair at Salem day. The order was made to department heads by the board today.

Carabinieri, storm guards and national republican guards (the former civil guards) who are on police duty were formed into a shock troop detachment and ordered to be ready to leave for the front on an hour's notice.

Ten thousand militiamen were held as a reserve ready to go to any part of the area.

Booth Attractive
Lane county's booth has a fine location and is easily located in the agricultural building. A turn-table, loaded with attractive canned goods from the Eugene Fruit Growers' association and with hundreds of big eggs, provides an air of life and activity that the stationary displays in booths from other counties do not have.

Greeting us at the booth were John F. Durr, chamber of commerce secretary, and R. C. Kuehner, county 4-H club leader, who arranged the display. By evening, John and Dick were about the two weariest individuals on the grounds but very pleased ones because a big crowd had gathered around the booth throughout the day.

A great deal of effort and time had been given to arranging the Lane exhibit. Across the back are sheaths of grain, flanked at either side by a large mural carved by the Grey Gypsy Craftsmen of Eugene. Quantities of produce from Lane farms and articles from local industries are arranged in the corners and along side the turntable, while banking the front are sacks of Lane's famous walnuts and filberts, and stacks of butter cartons from the local creameries.

Clubbers Active
In the 4-H exhibits building adjoining, Lane county's many-times-state-and-national prize winning 4-H members are right at the top when it comes to exhibiting projects and achievements.

Wandering through the stock barn (and the state has a fine lot of livestock exhibited this year), Lane stockmen and 4-H clubs are well represented.

The highlight event of the fair generally this year is the horse show, given each evening of the fair. Dean Wayne L. Morse of the University of Oregon law school was in two events in the show, Monday evening, riding Bourbon Ray, owned by Dr. Gilson Ross of Eugene; and later appearing in the combination horse five-gaited event with his Edgewood Bourbon.

The horse show is featured by the exhibitions of the 11th cavalry, U. S. A., the beautiful Arabian horses from the Kellogg Arabian farm at Pomona, the special act of Carnation Chief, and many other colorful events. Only standing room was available when the show opened Monday evening.

Five Eugeneans will be represented on the horse show program Tuesday night. Dean Morse is to be there with Oregon Mabel and colt. Mrs. Nelda Hayward is to ride Bourbon Rambler, Joe Rose will show Dandy, Dr. Ross will enter Bourbon Ray, and Roy McLean will exhibit Dixie and colt.

There are many other fair features—too numerous to include in this write-up—but those going should not miss the floral displays, featured this year particularly by an unusually fine dahlia show; and the art exhibit. The horse races in the afternoon, and the big carnival were packing them in, Monday, too.

A thing noted especially by fairgoers this year is the appearance of

the grounds. The lawn on the main grounds is especially green this year, while formal garden arrangements carry out the diamond design in honor of the 75th "fair birthday."

**Pioneer Dies at
Harrisburg Sunday**
HARRISBURG, Sept. 8.—(Special)—Homer Drinkard, son of William and Martha Drinkard, who crossed the plains from Missouri in 1865, died on his farm east of here, Sunday. He was born near Halsey, Oregon, June 24, 1874. He was married to Emma Cooley Thompson, daughter of George C. and Harriett Cooley of Brownsville, August 29, 1900. Mrs. Drinkard preceded him in death October 24, 1918.

Mr. Drinkard lived his entire life in Linn county except about eight years in Almira, Wash. He is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Velma Isom of Harrisburg, and step-son, Byron Thompson, of Portland, Oregon; also four sisters and two brothers, Mrs. Flora Taylor of Waterville, Wash.; Miss Anna Drinkard, of Halsey; Mrs. Etta Taylor of Tangent; Mrs. Hattie Jenks of Tangent; George W. Drinkard of Brownsville, and R. L. Drinkard of Almira, Washington.

He was a member of the M. E. church and also of Wildy Lodge, I. O. O. F. of Halsey. The funeral will be held at the Harrisburg M. E. church Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Interment will be made in the Alford cemetery.
