

SCHOOLS RE-OPEN AT SPRINGFIELD MONDAY MORNING

SPRINGFIELD, Sept. 12.—(Special)—Vacation days for more than 800 students in the Springfield public school system will end Monday, as all three units open for the fall term with prospects of increased enrollment in all departments.

At the close of registration at the high school this week, it was estimated by L. E. Marschat, city superintendent of schools, that enrollment there might run at about 350, a considerable increase over 1935-36. At the same time, similar gains were forecast for Lincoln and Brattain grade schools.

Students will be greeted by several changes in administration and educational facilities. After several years without a central superintendent, the school board late this spring named Mr. Marschat, principal of the high school, to the post. He will retain his principalship.

Through the use of the WPA, many improvements have been made in all units, with landscaping and inside work adding to the beauty and efficiency of the structures. One of the more important projects was the grading and leveling of Brattain athletic field; a thorough renovation of floors and desk improvements were also featured.

In accordance with a practice that is being followed extensively throughout the United States, high school students will have one-hour periods rather than the usual 45-minute class. This is coupled with a system of "supervised study," to take place in each class under the guidance of the instructor.

All students in the first three grades, and one section of the fourth, will be taught in Brattain school. The remainder of the grades will be in Lincoln, the new arrangement allowing for economy, and greater freedom in recreational, remedial, and educational work. Several new courses will also be put on the high school curriculum. Among the more important are the addition of an orchestra band, and gym club to be under the leadership of Paul Potter and Maxine Rau. School activities for the year will get under way as soon as enrollment is completed.

SPRINGFIELD CLUB SHOWS PROGRESS

SPRINGFIELD, Sept. 12.—(Special)—Considerable interest is being shown by young people here, in the establishment of the recreational club under the direction of Nathaniel Siegner. Meetings have been held every Thursday, with exceptional attendance.

Those groups already established and starting regular meetings next week include a "Rod and Gun Club," "Home Workshop Guild," "Discussion Club," which will cover the review of the newest books, and current topics, "Knitting and Crocheting Club."

The most serious interest has been shown in the "Little Theatre" because this project gives every member of the organization an opportunity to do his bit. Sewing clubs will take charge of the costumes, Art clubs will build and paint the stage scenery, Music groups will contribute their part. It is expected the plays will be written by members of the organization, some of whom are especially talented. The journalists will attend to the advertising, along with the help of the group interested in photography.

The N. Y. A. hopes to sponsor a series of weekly lectures (free to the public), on the subject of Personal Development, to show the necessity of initiative and self dependence.

Plans are still under consideration for the swimming pool and playground project.

WARPLANES FORM BACKGROUND FOR ANTI-SOVIET MEET

NURNBERG, Germany, Sept. 12.—The throbbing motors of 400 warplanes gave a military background today to Nazi Germany's anti-Soviet campaign—a crusade which observers believed was approaching announcement of practical steps against bolshevism.

The planes, trimotored bombers flying in formation, pursuit planes and craft of other types, awakened delegates and visitors in this Nazi convention city at dawn. Finally, approximately 400 planes were assembled at airports around Nurnberg in preparation for demonstrations scheduled Monday.

At the congress itself, German departmental leaders took up the anti-bolshevist campaign where Adolf Hitler, Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, Dr. Alfred Rosenberg and Rudolf Hess had left off.

Hermann Reischle, Nazi agricultural leader, in a speech contrasted "the ruthless exploitation of Soviet Russia peasants for the benefit of a clique of Jewish parasites" with what he said were the German farmer's constructive efforts on behalf of German farmers.

Erich Hilgenfeldt painted a bright picture of social welfare work in Germany, particularly in connection with the care of mothers and children.

He drew a black picture of family destruction and wholesale juvenile vagrancy and criminality which, he said, the Soviet system had produced in Russia.

In some quarters, Germany and Italy were linked in the predicted crusade toward the establishment of an international bloc opposing Russian governmental practices.

The presence of a fascist delegation from Italy at the national socialist meeting and the cordial reception given the visitors was responsible for the forecast of an alliance between Berlin and Rome.

Particular importance was attached to a statement by Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, Hitler's propaganda minister, warning "sides must be taken for or against (bolshevism) with full acceptance of the consequences."

REX HAS PAIR OF GREAT PICTURES

GAS CONSUMPTION GAINS 8 PER CENT ON PACIFIC COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 12.—(Special)—Pacific coast gas sales indicative of industrial trends, increased 8.1 per cent over last year in the first six months of 1936.

Clifford Johnstone, managing director of the Pacific Coast Gas association, said today the sales for California, Oregon, Washington, British Columbia, Nevada and Arizona reached a total of 91,507,022,000 cubic feet.

This compared with 84,673,403,000 last year.

The commercial and industrial customers recorded an impressive gain of more than 14 per cent—which is strikingly parallel to other gains reported from various sources on industrial trends.

The business firms used 45,383,831,000 cubic feet compared with 39,701,534,000 in the first half of last year.

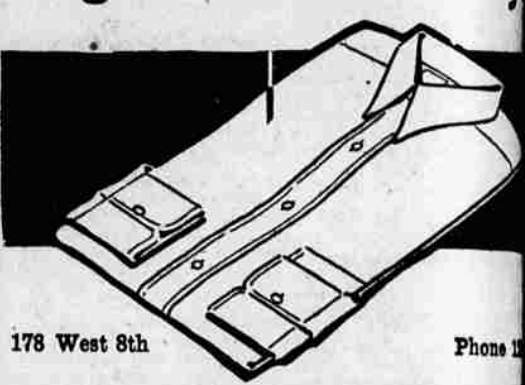
