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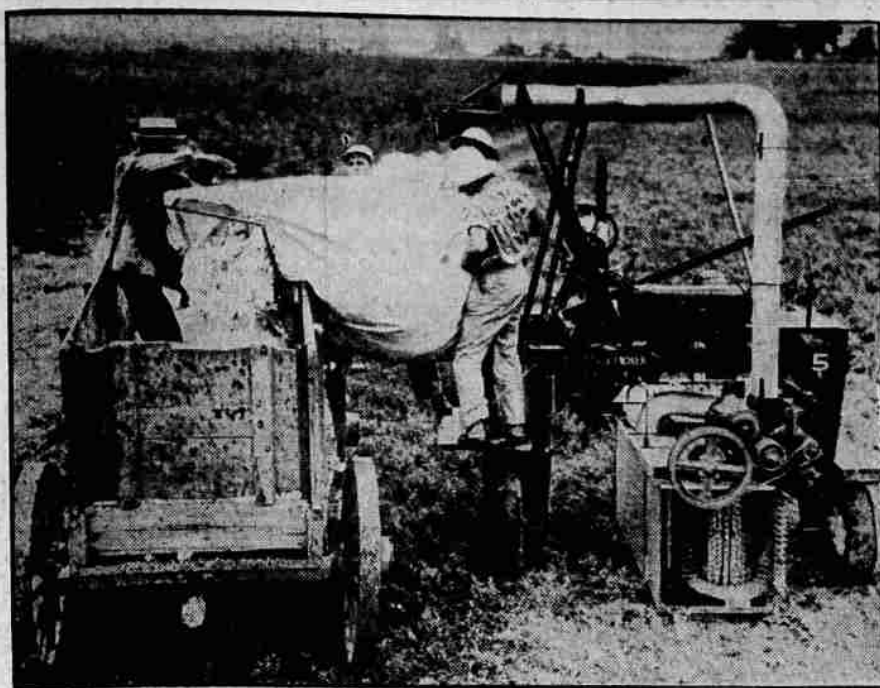

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Victoria, Former Queen of Spain, Sails For Son's Bed-Side In New York Hospital

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Only the gravity of her son's condition, friends agreed today, could have persuaded Victoria, unhappy former queen of Spain, to come to America to see the Count of Castelvigo.

Today the middle-aged Victoria, granddaughter of Britain's famous queen of that name, passed through the straits of Gibraltar enroute from Nice to New York.

In a New York hospital, awaiting the arrival of his mother Sept. 17, Count Alfonso lay critically ill after the eighth blood transfusion in two weeks designed to offset the ravages of hemophilia.

Accompanying Victoria are her daughter, Princess Beatrice; the latter's husband, Prince Alessandro Torlonia, son of the former Elis Moore of New York, and their seven-month-old baby.

It is the former queen's and princess' first trip to the United States, but it is the second time they have rushed to the count's bedside in two years. Their visit before forced them

to come face to face with the Cuban commoner he married, the former Edelmira Sampedro, who is now suing him for divorce.

The sons often have been attended by Victoria and her daughter, who trained as a nurse. But they arrived too late two years ago when Gonzalo, the youngest, died to death after an automobile accident in Austria.

Alfonso, the eldest, is in the most serious condition of his life after having a thigh bone lanced. He had bled intermittently for hours and even days at a time, since the operation Aug. 25.

Unhappiness has dogged Victoria and her family since she left England to become the bride of King Alfonso 30 years ago in Madrid. When they rode from church, a bomb thrown at them was deflected by a telephone wire and killed 24 people in a cheering crowd.

Her wedding, reputed to have cost \$10,000,000, was called "a love match." But today Victoria is estranged from her 50-year-old husband.

Money difficulties and disagreements over royalist plans in Spain and over their children are said to have separated the couple in middle age.

RAIN HELP OUT IN DROUGHT AREA; SOME CROPS GOOD

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—(AP)—

Continued rains, a late frost and a mild winter were listed today by federal crop experts as factors that could help remove the scars of drought between now and a new growing season.

Another reduction of nearly 2 per cent in the estimated total yield of the nation's crops for this year was coupled yesterday with a statement that the drought of 1936 was less damaging than the 1934 arid season.

Rains Help Out

Widespread rains late in August and since September 1 were said to have ended crop deterioration in "perhaps two-thirds" of the interior drought area.

The crop board said the total acreage harvested this year will probably be "about 10 per cent below average but still about 10 per cent greater than in 1934." It estimated total crop yields at "perhaps 10 per cent below average" but still "2 or 3 per cent greater" than two years ago.

Corn Yield Smaller

The forecast on corn yield was improved 1.3 per cent from a month earlier but the estimated 1,458,398,000 crop still was the smallest since 1881 and compared with 2,301,620,000 last year.

The total wheat crop was placed at 630,241,000 bushels, about 2,500,000 less than a month earlier because of the poor yield of spring wheats.

Improvement in yields over August 1 estimates were listed for oats, rice, buckwheat, hay, beans, potatoes, and all fruit crops.

Forecasts were revised downward for rye, barley and broomcorn.

COAST PEAR CROP IS MUCH GREATER

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 12.—(AP)—

Pacific coast production of pears will exceed last year's output some 3 1/2 million bushels, latest department of agriculture estimates indicate.

Federal estimates give the California-Oregon-Washington crop some 18,717,000 bushels, out of the total national crop of 23,814,000 bushels.

Last year the coast crop was 15,212,000 bushels out of the national total of 22,035,000.

The Pacific coast output dominates the field. Next to the coast states, New York stands best with 776,000 bushels estimated as of Sept. 1 for the 1936 crop.

OAKRIDGE CITIZENS Appeal To Highway Officials For Funds

A petition signed by citizens of Oakridge, asking the state highway commission to assist in the construction of the overhead crossing at Oakridge and the short stretch of road to connect Oakridge with the new Willamette highway is being sent by the Lane county court to the commission.

PWA and county funds are assured for all but about \$5000 of the cost of the structure and an effort is being made to induce the state commission and the Southern Pacific company to supply the deficiency.

County Judge Fred Fiek while in Portland a few days ago interviewed members of the commission regarding the matter but said he did not receive a great deal of encouragement. The railway officials there said they would take the matter up with higher officials.

Son of Alaskan Delegate Burned

JUNEAU, Alaska, Sept. 12.—(AP)—John Dimond, 18, son of Anthony J. Dimond, Alaska's democratic territorial delegate to congress, was recovering in a hospital from serious burns suffered in an explosion on board his gasoline-powered boat.

When he was attempting to start the engine, Dimond spilled gasoline on a stove. The fuel exploded and burned him painfully on the hands and face. Dimond's father was to arrive today from Ketchikan. He was re-elected in Tuesday's general election.

Idaho Forests Face Sweeping Flames

PIERCE, Ida., Sept. 12.—(AP)—Valuable white pine timber stood in the path of a growing forest fire in the Kelly creek area of the Clearwater national forest, 45 miles northeast of here, today.

Foresters reported here that the flames last night jumped the Clearwater river, which fire fighters had hoped would check the fire's spread. Although the fire was still confined to a blow-down area, officials feared a continuation of high winds of the last two days would endanger commercial stands. About 1000 men were fighting fire, rangers reported.

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OREGON BUSINESS STILL GOING UP; ALL COAST BETTER

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 12.—(AP)—

Reports from four fronts today indicated continued improvement in business conditions in Oregon and surrounding states.

The weekly report of the Western Pine association said new business, orders, and shipments for last week all exceeded totals for the same week last year. New business totaling 68,714,000 board feet, and shipments of 69,173,000 board feet, ran slightly ahead of the previous week's figures while production, 81,438,000 feet, was about the same.

Dun and Bradstreet said retail sales here were 10 to 12 per cent ahead of the corresponding week last year with employment better than in any similar period for several years.

Portland Stores Gain

From the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco came word that business in Portland department stores was 11.8 per cent better in August than in the same month of 1935. Gain for the year to date was 15.6 per cent.

Portland ran ahead of other Pacific coast cities both in month and year gains, the coast average being 11 per cent up for the year. Companies of the Pacific Coast Gas association, announced that sales in Oregon had risen 14.6 per cent in the first six months of 1936 over the first half of the previous year. Sales totaled 1,778,000,000 cubic feet.

Gains reported for other coast areas were California, 7.7 per cent; Washington, 11.9 per cent, and British Columbia, 4 per cent.

Huge Chandelier Is Most Sought Article

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 12.—(AP)—The huge, cut-glass chandelier, which Portlanders have been shining from the historic H. W. Corbett home in the downtown business section for many years, brought \$380 at the auction sale—the highest price to be paid for any of the Corbett furnishings.

The furnishings are being sold prior to raising of the pioneer residence of the late senator from Oregon whose widow died a few months ago.

The chandelier went to Claude E. Jensen, former theatre owner.

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
