It was the opinion of Chief Carl Bergman that this burglar has been the one responsible for the majority of fraternity and sorority thefts recently. He explained that his manner of "working" appeared to be the same, and the descriptions secured so far have tallied closely.

Chief Bergman is not giving out details of his plans to spread the motor patrols but says he is determined to put a stop to these crimes which are quite common at this season of the year.
