"My idea of the way to restore prosperity is to put one gallon of alcohol with nine gallons of gas, take off all taxes on this mixture and continue the tax on straight gasoline," he says. "The use of alcohol will create new wealth through aiding employment and the first to benefit would be the farmer. No one would be hurt, all would benefit and we wouldn't have to take from one to give to another, as we are doing now."

Commenting on the recent Edward-Simpson case, Dickens laughed and said: "Edward's doing just like old Solomon and David did, isn't he?"

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the better quality goods, one store reported that whereas three years ago lingerie priced at \$1.95 was most sought, last year goods costing nearly \$3 was most popular and this year lingerie priced at \$3.95 is moving fastest.

Stores handling ready-to-wear lines for men and women report increases ranging from ten percent to 18 or 19 percent. Good quality accessories apparently were in greatest demand in these stores.

Furniture lines are moving approximately 50 percent better than a year ago, this increase being attributed principally to the general improvement noted throughout the year. However, furniture dealers report customers are seeking good quality merchandise for improving their homes.

Cash business is good this year, merchants report, with credit business and collections running about normal, little difference being reported from last year's condition.

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nation after the committee had heard Treasurer C. B. Goodspeed announce a party deficit of \$901,501. Goodspeed revealed the republicans spent \$6,540,776.90 in their unsuccessful effort to elect Gov. Alf. M. Landon to the presidency.

"I have no particular defense of the last campaign," the red-haired Kansan said with a thrust of his jaw. "There were lots of errors but I told the committee at the start there would be."

He said he had talked with Landon and the latter agreed the committee should have an early opportunity to select its future leadership.

Committee member Arthur W. Curtis, Missouri, offered a resolution expressing confidence in Hamilton and refusing to consider his resignation. Curtis named Landon and Hamilton of a "double cross" in the telegram Landon sent the national convention at Cleveland outlining his views on the gold program.

"For three days," he said, "the gold clause was kept out of the republican platform as a concession to Sen. William E. Borah. Then when Landon

was nominated, safely he sent the 'gold telegram'."

Suggested by Fish as a possible national chairman to take Hamilton's place, Frank Burras, Seattle, criticized the executive committee as a "closed corporation" and said that "certain men on the committee are choking the party to death through their fear of radicalism."

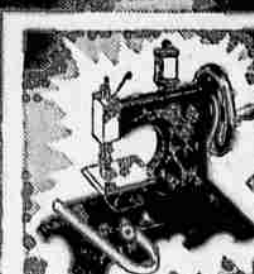
