LICENSE TAGS FOR BIKES SUGGESTED

could determine the owner by a smaller tag. "I realize," Chief Bergman said, "that we can't make this code too tough. We have to consider the pocketbooks of the bicycle owners. I don't insist that these license tags be lighted at night as is required of motorists, for example, but I do feel that we won't have any effective control unless we have easy identification from a distance." He added with a chuckle, "Imagine what a time we'd have if we had to look at the dashboard of a car to identify its owner."

It would not be necessary to have these tags stamped out of metal, he feels. A printed metal or waterproof cardboard oblong would be sufficient. Only one tag should be required—on the rear of the machine. These should be provided without cost at a nominal charge by the city and affixed by a simple clamping device. A registration card should be carried by the driver in addition to the license tag.

which they will seek to make this situation possible; cooperation between the intelligent youthful and mature citizens of the country; abolition of the criminal syndicalism laws; encourage both labor and capitalist to continue their present unsocial tactics and make "our success on the fact that we can starve and drown them out by organizing the majority of our good citizens into making such a noise that the cries of the Hearsts and Browners will eventually sound like rat squeaks"; revive the democratic spirit by use of massed public opinion; enroll all citizens in the fight; forget "county courthouse" politics; give examinations to keep out the intolerant, the bigoted, the red-baiters; not tolerate "any attempt by the selfish financial or political groups to dictate our policies."

Group Non-Political

The Oregon Liberty association is non-partisan in politics, and doesn't care who runs the government as long as they govern intelligently. There will be two types of membership to the association: active and endorsement. The active members will not exceed the age of 35; the endorsement members from 35 on up, and "both types will be sworn in after they have demonstrated sufficient faith and intelligence, tolerance and familiarity with the problem of uniting all groups to work cooperatively for a common end—the preservation of democracy."

TENSION INCREASES IN EASTERN UNIONS

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 19.—(AP)—Peace negotiations collapsed on two fronts but dragged along on another in the west coast maritime strike tonight while tension increased between "regular" and "rank and file" union elements in the east.

Both shipowners and representatives of the cooks and stewards union conceded week-long peace-making efforts had broken down in an impasse over workers' demands for an 8-hour day.

Employer representative T. G. Plant met to negotiate with the masters, mate and pilots union and announced shortly thereafter a "complete disagreement" over demands for union recognition and employment preference for its members.

Plant announced, however, he ex-

pected to meet again with the union representatives. The union issued a statement contradicting one by Plant asserting demands for union control of ship's officers was "unjust."

However, Harry Lundberg, sailors union spokesman, suggested along with Plant in an effort to reach an agreement affecting that union and employers. For several days Plant and Lundberg had negotiated and were reported near agreement on all issues except one having to do with Alaska conditions. Details were not given.

JOHN MAUGHAN DIES IN HOSPITAL HERE

John F. Maughan, 64, of Colma, Cal., died at the Sacred Heart hospital Saturday at the age of 64. Born May 4, 1872, in Logan, Utah, he lived in Montana and Washington before coming to Oregon in 1930. He is survived by two brothers and seven sisters, one of whom is Mrs. J. S. Turner of Eugene. Funeral arrangements will be announced from the Vatch chapel later.
