

# Egg Prices Move Up In Eugene; Stock Market Shows Slight Losses

## QUOTATIONS HIGHER BY TWO CENTS PER DOZEN ON MONDAY

Pacific Co-op price of eggs to retailers advanced two cents a dozen on all grades except "cheer" Monday. The prices ranged from 32 to 25 cents a dozen.

Buying prices of eggs remained steady and unchanged, according to different buyers whose prices are quoted daily.

Wheat remained at \$1.02 a bushel in Eugene and other grains were quiet. Butter and poultry were steady.
