

CHRISTMAS BRINGS FULL SCHEDULE TO WHITE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—(AP)—The nation's first lady announced plans today for the busiest White House Christmas since the Roosevelts came to live here.

The president and Mrs. Roosevelt will give their six grandchildren a joyous family celebration, and send messages of good cheer to Americans in general and needy children in particular.

The tiny stocking of five-month-old Elliott Roosevelt, Jr., who already has arrived with his parents and sister, Ruth Chandler, will be hung for the first time on the fireplace in the president's room.

By its side will be those of President and Mrs. Roosevelt and 13 other members of the family.

Miss Ethel Du Pont, fiancée of the president's son Franklin, probably will have Christmas dinner with the family.

Before the family Christmas, the Roosevelts have scheduled a busy Christmas eve.

Mrs. Roosevelt will help distribute food and toy bags to 1700 children at a theatre party that morning. She will assist the president in receiving the White House office force at noon, and later the household staff. At 2 p. m. she will attend a Salvation Army Christmas service.

The whole family will go to the community tree lighting in Lafayette park at 5 p. m., when the president will speak in a nationwide broadcast.

An hour later the first lady will greet thousands of children gathered at radio loud-speakers in 200 Washington alleys, where they dwell.

Then she will go home to the White House, where Girl Scouts will sing carols in the east room.

The president already has begun reading favorite parts of Dickens' Christmas Carol to the children each evening.

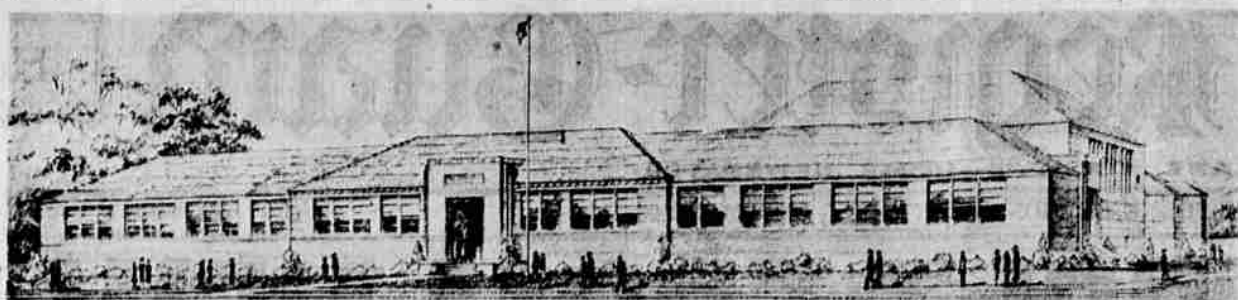

THE CONTRACT has been let for the construction of the new union high school building at Junction City to Barham Bros. of Salem, and work will be started immediately. C. N. Freeman of Portland is architect. The building, sketch of which is shown, will have a frontage of 229 feet with a wing on each end, one of them 121 feet long and the other 129 feet. The building will have 12 class rooms, three office rooms and a large gymnasium and besides there will be a separate structure to be used for classes in agriculture. The entire building will be of brick veneer construction. A union high school district was formed out of 13 districts, with Junction City as center, the past year.

sault of stormy weather poured 3.38 inches on drought-depleted shores.

Elsewhere over the state high winds blew, the sun shone or black clouds drifted by leaving a trace of rain.

Telephone Lines Broken
Telephone circuits were disrupted at several points in the Portland-Tillamook region, rock and earth tumbled down to threaten motorists on Canyon Road outside Portland and power lines fell under the wind pressure. The damage was not great and no injuries were reported.

Southeast storm warnings along the coast were lowered after a gale which reached a velocity of 60 miles an hour at times subsided. The weather bureau said another storm was swinging down from the north but high pressure areas might counteract it. The forecast was for unsettled weather with occasional rains tonight and tomorrow.

Edward Wells, federal meteorologist, said temperatures probably would be mild over the holidays, removing any prospect of a snowy Christmas for most sections. Rain more likely will be the weather fare.

A heavy rain started to fall today at The Dalles, although the soaking downpour in Portland tapered off to occasional drizzles. The precipitation at The Dalles totaled 22 of an inch, while 71 was recorded at Eugene, 1.78 at Salem, a trace at Klamath Falls, 74 at Marshfield, a light rain at Roseburg and .02 at Bend.

Sunny at Astoria
The sun shone at Astoria, while a brisk south wind and cloudy skies with a threat of rain prevailed over the Rogue river valley at Medford and occasional heavy showers drenched Grants Pass. Rain threatened at Baker and a trace fell at Pendleton, while the precipitation at La Grande measured .02 of an inch in the last four days.

Weather records showed that rainfall at Klamath Falls was two and one-half inches under last year, about even with last year at Roseburg, .33 under last year at Grants Pass, nearly six inches below the October-November-December record of 1935 at Salem, two inches ahead of 1935 at Eugene and four inches ahead at Bend, about two inches below 1935 at Pendleton, three inches ahead at La Grande and 10 inches under 1935 at Marshfield.

In some instances, however, the 1938 totals ran ahead of 1935 because of heavy spring rains, thus offsetting the fall drought.

Trotsky Moves Again;

OSLO, Norway, Dec. 23.—(AP)—An embittered and wandering Leon Trotsky will spend Christmas on the high seas, bound for Mexico—the only nation willing to shelter the exiled Russian Bolshevik after his asylum in Norway was terminated. Trotsky and his wife were spirited out of Norway and put aboard an unidentified steamer Saturday, it was disclosed after news of their departure had been withheld for several days to avoid demonstrations.

Credit Control Will
Help Stabilization

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Treasury officials said today operations of the administration's new credit control machinery will be closely aligned with those of the \$2,000,000,000 stabilization fund.

Under a program announced this week, the treasury will sell discount bills to "sterilize" gold imports.

Bills in an amount equal to inflows will be sold weekly, thus removing from the money market a sum equivalent to that added by imports.

tion of lasting peace, arise from "the institutions of a free people."

"There is no need for this conception to be limited to the American nations," he added. "There is an imperative necessity for its immediate world-wide application."

"Democracies today are free to express the desire of all peoples for peace. While favoring the maintenance of a military power adequate to guard their security and to protect their national interest against aggression, they continue to work for peace by every practicable means."

"They believe that future peace can be assured by the development of public opinion everywhere that will utterly repudiate the acts and utterances of statesmen propagating doctrines of militarism."

The adoption by the conference of an inter-American consultative pact for the maintenance of peace and other measures looking toward closer economic and cultural co-operation among Americans were hailed by secretary of state of the United States as a program "broad and more basic than ever before."

MEDFORD, Ore., Dec. 23.—(AP)—Clayborn Glass, farmer, of the Table Rock district, died from a fractured skull, sustained in an auto accident on the Pacific highway, two miles north of this city, the district attorney's office reports.

The state report says that an auto driven by S. Fujii, Japanese, of Seattle, Wash., and the Glass auto, collided head-on, shortly after midnight. Fujii, and a countryman, are retained for questioning.

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BRITISH SEEK TO HALT WAR SPREAD

LONDON, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Great Britain, taking the lead in efforts to prevent the Spanish civil war from spreading over Europe, asked 27 other member nations in the non-intervention committee today to halt foreign enlistments in Spanish armies by January 4. The British proposal asked specific pledges from the international delegates that their governments would not allow fresh volunteers to leave for the Spanish frontiers.

MADRID, Dec. 23.—(AP)—The crash of enemy shells in the trenches northwest of the Spanish capital today foreshadowed a grim Christmas for the city's socialist defenders. Militiamen at the front wistfully expressed the hope some of them might be allowed to return to Madrid for the day, but the ever-present fear of insurgent attack on the strategic communications with El Escorial held them to their posts.

PORTLAND, Dec. 23.—(AP)—A suspect in several Portland holdups knocked out Detective Sergeant John Schum and escaped as the officer sought to question him. The blow cut the detective under the eye and bruised his nose. Four other robbery suspects were in custody in a police drive to curb a series of "stickups."

Worsted Mill Runs
But Pickets Stay

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 23.—(AP)—The Oregon Worsted company, closed by strike since Nov. 5, resumed partial operations today while pickets paraded in front of the plant and a union demand for prosecution of company officials under the "criminal provisions" of the Wagner labor act winged its way toward Washington.

The union charged "intimidation" as scores of motorists drove through the rain on their way home yesterday evening. One car struck the victim.

Union Will Unload Argentine Grain; Poultry Needs Corn

PORTLAND, Dec. 23.—(AP)—Longshoremen officials said today that a super cargo had been dispatched to the motorship Primero in the start of operations to unload part of the 7400-ton cargo of Argentine corn sought by poultry producers on a plea of heavy holiday feeding losses.

Only part of the cargo, tied up here by the maritime strike, will be unloaded inasmuch as 2700 tons is consigned to Seattle. Unloading of the vessel has been the subject of an investigation for several days and at one stage Gov. Charles Martin asked producers if they would "go and get it" if the longshoremen refused to unload the corn. The union replied it would unload only if a need was proved.

As soon as the supercargo can complete preliminary steps, an unloading crew will be sent to the vessel to start work, probably sometime this afternoon.
