

F. D.'S BUDGET IS BOLSTERED AS BIG INCOME POURS IN

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—President Roosevelt is about ready to report to the nation that the government is enjoying its biggest income year since 1920.

Mr. Roosevelt expects income for the current 1937 fiscal year to be about \$5,665,000,000. That is \$1,000,000,000 more revenue than the Hoover administration collected in the fiscal years of 1932 and 1933 together.

But there will be another deficit for the current fiscal year, and so far there has been no official assurance that federal receipts will cover all expenditures in the new fiscal year (1938) which will begin next July 1.

The president's budget message will be sent to congress next week. It will contain final figures for the 1936 fiscal year, which ended last June 30, and revised estimates of the outlook for the current fiscal year. It will estimate receipts and expenditures for the next year.

Spokesmen for and against the New Deal repeatedly have expressed the wish that congress and the nation would cram a bit for this annual exercise in mathematics. Their idea is that the taxpayers and the legislators who vote the money for spending should thoroughly understand what the budget means.

Roosevelt "Figures" Hit

Anti-New Deal spokesmen, notably former President Herbert Hoover, have charged that Mr. Roosevelt uses a double-entry budget system which does not properly present the state of national finances. That charge is made because the president has segregated certain large items of expenditure from his regular budget and classed them as "recovery and relief" spending, related chiefly to overcoming "economic emergencies."

Under that system, Mr. Roosevelt was able to report one year ago that the budget was balanced as far as regular federal expenditures for the

current fiscal year were concerned. He said he would ask later for a relief appropriation and estimated it would cause a deficit of from 1,000,000,000 to \$3,000,000,000.

Possibly cognizant of the double entry criticism, Mr. Roosevelt also announced that with the start of the

current fiscal year certain classes of expenditures had been shifted from the emergency to the regular category. These included agricultural adjustment administration, civilian conservation corps and public works.

Balance Destroyed

Almost coincident with announcement that regular budget expenditures would be kept within federal income, the supreme court destroyed the balance by outlawing the AAA

processing taxes, thus substantially reducing treasury revenue. Later in the session congress authorized immediate cash payment of the soldiers' bonus, further throwing the budget out of line.

Net result of the actions was to increase the deficits for the fiscal year 1936 and for the current fiscal year. Greatest shock was to the 1936 budget. Mr. Roosevelt had estimated his deficit as of last June 30 would be \$2,682,482,302. Actually, it was \$4,360,601,492, or greater than in any year except 1919 when war costs put the treasury more than \$13,000,000,000 in the red.

For the current fiscal year the outlook is better. Mr. Roosevelt estimates, now, that the treasury's net red ink figure will fall to \$1,516,126,300.

EXPERTS WORRIED AS GOLD INCREASES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—(AP)—Treasury experts today calculated the world's 1936 crop of gold at a new peak and pondered its effect on international money markets.

Coincident estimates from the bureau of mines indicated the forthcoming annual report on production of precious metals in the United States would show an all-time record harvest of both gold and silver.

Production estimates for the world, including Russia, suggested the total output of gold this year might approximate 40,000,000 ounces, compared with a previous peak of 30,000,000 in 1935.

Estimates for the first 10 months of 1936 showed that Russia alone mined 4,500,000 ounces more than during the corresponding period last year. The tight grip governments now have on their monetary structures makes it difficult to predict how the outpouring will be reflected in money, experts said.

It was the general opinion that the effect would be cushioned in the United States by the treasury's recently announced decision to "sterilize" newly acquired gold to prevent its use in credit inflation.

Newly mined domestic gold was estimated at 3,500,000 ounces during the first 10 months of the year, compared with about 3,000,000 for the same period in 1935.

An unprecedented upturn in silver production carried the 10-month output of that metal to 31,000,000 ounces, 14,000,000 more than the previous all-time record of 37,000,000 mined in 1915.

Pope Hides Suffering During Three Months

VATICAN CITY, Jan. 1.—(AP)—For three months Pope Pius suffered from varicose veins, with his valet, Giovanni Malvestiti, the only other person knowing his condition, reliable sources disclosed today.

The two—master and servant—attempted to cure the condition with home remedies, these sources said, without telling any one else in the Vatican. Not even the Pontiff's doctors were informed of the affliction, it was reported.

ICC PRODUCES SET OF DRIVING RULES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—(AP)—The Interstate Commerce Commission moved today to reduce the death hazard on America's highways by setting up driving rules for commercial motor vehicles.

At the close of a year in which fatalities reached an estimated 37,500—a new high record—the commission made public its broad regulations to become effective next July 1.

Hope was expressed that rules would be followed by the states "in the interest of uniformity."

Among rules set up is one that speed must be within state or local limits where these exist and otherwise must be "reasonable or prudent under the existing conditions."

The regulations set a minimum age of 21 for new drivers employed, a requirement that they must read and speak English and that they must bear proper identifications.

The information gathered on drivers incidental to identifications, the commission said, may be used as the basis of determining the need for a federal drivers licensing system.

Among other regulations were requirements that vehicles should be in good mechanical condition, that fuses should be set up beside cars broken down on the highway at night, that explosives and similar carriers stop at railroad crossings. Transportation of hitchhikers was prohibited.
