

Oregon's Basketball Warriors Ready For Tough Portland Independents

WEBFOOT HOOPERS MEET UNION OIL QUINTET TONIGHT

Howard Hobson will parade his colorful University of Oregon varsity basketball team in its final pre-season game tonight at McArthur court against the rugged, high scoring Union Oilers of Portland. The contest will start at 8 o'clock.

Tonight's game will be the second meeting between the teams this week. Oregon won a spectacular overtime game at Portland Monday night, 43 to 38, after Ken Purdy had tied the count at 32-32 at the end of the regular playing time. The Oilers led all the way until the last few minutes.

Beat O. S. C. Wednesday

Fresh from a decisive victory over Oregon State at Corvallis Wednesday night, 31 to 24, the Oilers will be led by Wally Palmberg, all-American forward for the Staters last year. Palmberg, playing the finest ball of his career according to critics, paced the Oilers against Oregon with 15 points and against the Beavers with 14.

Alding Palmberg in the independents' cause will be four ex-Oregon "greats," Roland Rourke, Willard Jones, Jack Robertson and Budd Jones. These five men are due to start tonight's game. Other Oiler stars are Howard Grenier, Clyde Wagner, Harold Inman, King Bailey, Jerry Thomas and Herb Palmberg, all former collegians.

Average 48 Points

The high scoring Webfoots, who have averaged 48 points a game in their opening nine practice encounters, will attempt to make it two straight over the Oilers by out-speeding and out-charging the independents. This year's Oregon five is regarded as the fastest and hardest-driving ever turned out here.

Coach Hobson has not yet named his starting lineup, but will select it from his first eight men. They are Wally Johansen, Dave Silver, Laddie Gale and John Lewis, forwards; Slim Wintermute, center, and Ken Purdy, Bob Anet and Bill Courtney, guards.

Silver was high man in the first Union Oil game with 19 points, one of them coming on free throws. Purdy was the individual hero of that game, however, with his two midfloor howlers that tied the count in the final minute of play. Silver, Wintermute, Purdy and Anet, in that order, have been the Webfoots' high scorers in the nine games played to date.

There will be no reserved seats for tonight's game, according to Anson Cornell, athletic manager. The complete west side balcony will be thrown open for general admission tickets.

Broncos and Tigers Gird For Grid War

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 1.—(AP)—Husky footballers from Santa Clara and Louisiana State prepared to do their part in ushering in the 1937 sports season today by clashing before a record Sugar Bowl crowd of 42,000.

Louisiana's undefeated southwest conference champions were rated a 2 to 1 favorite over the once beaten Broncos from the coast on the rain softened turf of Tulane stadium. The kickoff was set for 2:30 p. m. (E. S. T.).

It will be the third Sugar Bowl game. Tulane beat Temple in the first and T.C.U. nosed out L.S.U. 9-3 last year.

GARY STAYS WITH PREP ASSOCIATION

PORTLAND, Jan. 1.—(AP)—The Oregon High School Athletic association persuaded John L. Gary, secretary, to reconsider his resignation and stay on until June 1.

The veteran secretary and superintendent of schools at West Linn previously announced he would withdraw at the winter meeting held yesterday. He recommended employment of a full-time secretary with offices at Portland.

Representatives from every district in the state approved limitation of interscholastic athletic eligibility to eight semesters instead of nine. The ruling goes into effect Jan. 1, 1938.

A special committee will investigate an insurance program to protect young athletes in high school contests.

Duquesne Has Edge In Orange Bowl Mix

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 1.—(AP)—Duquesne and Mississippi State set out today to determine which was the better football team in Miami's sun-drenched Orange Bowl.

The giant-killing eleven from Pittsburgh was made a slight favorite over the stalwart maroons, chiefly on the strength of upset victories over unbeaten Pittsburgh and Marquette during the regular season. Some 12,000 spectators were expected for the game.

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ERNIE PILUSO TO ENTER RING WITH HOOSIER HOTSHOT

The 45-minute semi-final matches Headlock Hagen and Don Sugai in another mat epic, pitting the terrible skull-crunching Hagen headlock against Sugai's blasting dropkicks.

The thirty-minute opener brings together Noel Franklin, Portland speedmerchant, and Dilly Davis, Jackson's flashy pupil.

The bouts open at 8:30, and tickets will be available all day at Obaka and the Club.

Pitt-Washington Scrap to be Soggy Struggle; Husky Odds Drop as Rain Continues

PASADENA, Cal., Jan. 1.—(AP)—Washington and Pittsburgh, a pair of powerful football teams that have appeared here five times and always left without winning, clashed in the 20th Rose Bowl game today before the largest crowd in the history of the event and the second richest gate.

The playing field of the huge rose-draped bowl was drenched by intermittent rains that began last Friday. Only a bright sun early today could make it hard and fast.

Should it rain before the battle starts at 2:15 p. m., P. S. T., it might send Pittsburgh into the post of favorite, Washington, which had been a 10-8 choice last week, steadily has fallen off in favor because of the possibility of a wet field which would slow down the Huskies' razzle-dazzle attack.

Crowds Pour In

The vanguard of 87,193 persons who will pay more than \$200,000 to see the game, started arriving in this city at the crack of dawn. The previous attendance high of 81,735 was set last year when Stanford beat Southern Methodist. And the record gate of \$306,421.15 was set in 1930 when Southern California defeated Pittsburgh. The record crowd this year is due to addition of "teacher seats."

U.S.G.A. Cuts Number Of Clubs to Fourteen

NEW YORK, Jan. 1.—(AP)—The U. S. Golf association today announced a rule amendment prohibiting use of more than 14 clubs after Jan. 1, 1938.

Three reasons were given for the change: Relief to caddies from unfair burdens. Reduction of delays in play on the theory players will spend less time in deciding which club to use.

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Battling Buckeyes Triumph in South

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 1.—(AP)—Ohio State's basketball prestige was upheld today by the record of twin victories in a pair of 4-subheaders involving Washington, Southern California and U. C. L. A.

The barnstorming Buckeyes, who beat Southern California 40-33 Wednesday night, overwhelmed U.C.L.A. 48-39 on New Year's eve, Washington, which edged out U.C.L.A. 52-51 in an overtime contest in the first doubleheader, was humbled by Southern California, 45-31, in the wind-up program.

Washington's Huskies appeared off form while Southern California piled up a 21-7 advantage in the first half and kept at least 6 points ahead throughout the final period.
