S. P. Official, Well Known Here, Dies
D. W. Campbell, assistant general manager of the Southern Pacific railway, well-known in Eugene and Springfield, died at Santa Monica, Cal., December 24, according to word received here by his friends.

Mr. Campbell was here frequently when the company was buying the proposed terminal grounds in Springfield and made many friends in this part of the state. He was then assistant general manager in charge of the northern division and was transferred to the southern division in 1935. He was 67 years old.
